The father of the above Ola Bells (Nicholson) Sizemore was one, Charles R. I. Nicholson, born February 13th, 1857; died

Charles R. I. Nicholson, married Alice Cain in DeKalb county, Alabama.

The father of Charles R. I. Nicholson, was Warren D. Nicholson, born April 21st, 1828; died July 28th, 1897.

Warren D. Nicholson and Julia A. Grayham were married on December 31st, 1850.

Julia A. Grayham, was born December 29th, 1830; died September 16th, 1886.

The father of Warren D. Nicholson, was William R. Nicholson (called Uncle Billie), he was born July 10th, 1800; died

William R. Nicholson, married Jane Adair on December 3rd, 1820.

Jane Adair was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina, March 11th, 1797.

Mrs. Jane Nicholson, (who was Jane Adair) wife of William R. Nicholson, was born in Pendleton District, S. C. on March 11th, 1797 and died in DeKalb County, Alabama on September 23rd, 1867. (See obituary).

The First Methodist Church in DeKalb county, Alabama was organized at the above William R. Nicholson's home at Nicholson, Alabama (then) near Dawson, Alabama, six miles from Collinsville, Alabama at the foot of Sand Mountain, in Sand Valley and the old Nicholson's cemetery is there.

Three Nicholson brothers came from South Carolina to this valley.

Another whose name she could not remember, but he died unmarried and is buried at the old Collinsville, and at least one sister, Mary Ann Nicholson was born in the year 1806 in S.C. She married John B. Morgan, Sr., who was born in S. C. in the year 1818. She and her husband came from S. C. in covered wagons from South Carolina to Alabama after 1835 and settled at Langston, Jackson county, Alabama.

HENRY NORWOOD: Planter, sheriff, Major Gen. State Militia and member of Ala. Legislature, was born in Franklin County, Tennessee and died July 1840, at Bellefonte, Jackson County, Alabama. Was a son of Samuel Norwood who lived near Winchester, Tennessee. The early American Ancestors were of English stock and settled in Va. and North Carolina. He was a man of good education, a planter and slave owner, located in Jackson County, 1820. He served as Lt. in War of 1812; was a Capt. in Creek and Seminole Wars in Florida, 1836-40; and at the time of his death was both Sheriff and Major Gen. of State Militia. He represented his County in the legislature at the sessions of 1831-32-33-35. Married 1st - Aletha, daughter of George Caperton, who resided near Bolivar, Jackson Co Ala. Originally Virginians who had removed first to Ga. and later to Alabama. Married 2nd - Sophia Metts, daughter of ~~#####~~ James I. and Margarete (Praigmore) Green, the former a native of N. J. and the latter of Tennessee. Children by first marriage - 1. Samuel C.; 2. Eleanor; 3. George A.; 4. John H. (QV); 5. Hugh J.; 6. Elizabeth; 7. Mary; by 2nd marriage - 8. William H.

JOHN HENRY NORWOOD: Lawyer, Brig-Gen., C.S. Army, State Senator, member constitutional convention, 1875, Probate Judge, was born Nov. 23, 1828, at Bellefonte, Jackson County, Alabama, died there Nov. 1891. Son of Henry and Aletha (Caperton) Norwood (QV). He was educated in the public schools of Jackson County; spent 3 years in Irving College, Tenn.; read law in his native village and admitted to the bar in 1852; was appointed Probate Judge in 1855, and was shortly thereafter elected to succeed himself, holding office until March 1861, when he resigned for military service. He entered the Confederate Army as first Lt. in Bradford's Co., Second Ala. Inf. Reg., resigned his office in a few months to return home, and raised 5 companies which became "Norwood's Battalion", in the 43 Tenn. Inf. Reg. of which he was elected Lt. Col. He was captured at Ft. Donelson, imprisoned at Ft. Warren; was exchanged at Richmond; once more entered the service and was severely wounded at Peach Tree Creek. He resumed the practice of his profession after the close of hostilities, and in 1865 was elected to the State Senate was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, 1876; was again elected Probate Judge of Jackson County, 1886 and was in this position at the time of his death. He was an extensive planter, and at one time sheriff. He was a member of the Christian Church; a Democrat; and a Mason. Married; Dec. 25, 1856, Margaret, daughter John N. & Mary Netherland of Bellefonte. Her parents were natives of Virginia and settled in Alabama in its pioneer period.

JOSEPH NORWOOD: Business man, was born Dec. 20 - 1854 at Darling, S. C. and died 1919; son of James H. & Mary Roberts (Brooks) Norwood, the former who was a lawyer, a native of Hartsville, S. C.; and was for several years member of the S. C. Legislature; grandson of John W. & Melissa Brooks of Greenville, S. C.; Great-Grandson of Capt. John Norwood, who served in the R. War. Mr Norwood was educated in the common schools of Lowndes County with one term at the Agricultural and mechanical college, Auburn. He was a farmer and merchant at Fort Deposit; from 1885-87 was Mayor; removed to Montgomery serve as vice-president of the Exchange National Bank; he was a delegate from Lowndes County to the Alabama Constitutional Convention of 1901; served on the committees on the executive Dept. and on amending the constitution and miscellaneous provisions in that body; and was State Senator from 16th district in 1903. Democrat, Baptist. Married Feb. 5, 1880, Virginia, daughter of John A. & Matti Martha (Warren) Tyson of Lowndes County. Children were: 1. Josie Pearl; 2. Virginia Tyson, married Edward S. Watts; 3. Mary Matilda; 4. Florence; 5. Jamie Isabel.

JOHN H. NORWOOD: Probate Judge of Jackson County, was born in Bellefonte, November 23, 1828. He was a son of Henry & Aletha (Caperton) Norwood, native of S. C. & Va., respectively. The Sr., Mr. Norwood was in the War of 1812, and held the rank of Lt. He came to Jackson County in 1820 and here was an extensive planter and slave owner. He took a prominent part in the Indian wars of his time holding the rank of Capt. in the Creek War and Col. in the Seminole War. He subsequently served several terms in both branches of the State Legislature where he acquitted himself with the highest honor, and to the entire satisfaction of his constituency. He died in 1840, holding the rank of Major-Gen. of the militia. The subject of this sketch was reared on a farm, received such education as could be obtained in the schools of the county, and spent three years at Irving College. He read law in the village of his nativity, and was admitted to the bar in 1852. After having practiced three years he was appointed Probate Judge, and served under that appointment twelve months. He was then elected to the office and held it until March, 1861 when he resigned and entered the Confederate Army as first Lt. in Capt. Bradford's Co. Second Ala. Reg. During that summer he resigned this position, returned his home and raised five companies and with them joined the 43 Tenn. Reg. of which he was elected Lt. Col. He was captured at Fort Donelson, imprisoned at Fort Warren, and in July of the same year, exchanged at Richmond, Va. After this he went to Vicksburg in Gen. Loring's Division, participated in the fight at Port Gibson and the bombardment of Vicksburg. After the fall of that City he went to East Tenn. and was subsequently engaged at Ringold, Resaca, and all the fights of the Atlanta campaign. In 1864, under the direction of the War Dept. he recruited a brigade in Ala. and commanded it to the close of the war. At White's Landing he surrendered leaving the service with the rank of Brigadier-General. Returning to his native village, he resumed the practice of law, and in 1865 was elected to the State Senate, where he took an active part in the proceedings of that assembly. In 1886 he was elected Probate Judge. His term will expire in 1892. When not on the discharge of the duties of the various offices to which his people have called him the Judge's extensive law practice has been diversified by the attention given to his farming interests. Judge Norwood was married December 25th, 1856 to Miss Margaret, daughter of John Netherland who came to Ala. in 1820. The family are communicants of the Presbyterian Church and the Judge belongs to the Masonic order.

I wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of Nov 2 enclosing check for \$6.00 for the book "Hopkins of Tex. and related families" for which please accept my thanks.

I also wish to thank you for the fine information which you gave me in your letter. I hope that you made copies of the various Hancock mills in Bastrop County, Texas and that you will send me copies of these mills at your earliest convenience. I think it would be especially interesting to have the complete will of William R (Burr) Hancock, for it is my understanding that he was killed in the Mexican War. In the abstract of this will, which you sent me, you failed to give the date of this will and the date of its probate. I think that in wills, if the entire will is not copied the date it was written and the date it was probated

The book and number of page where it was recorded, are of the interest importance. I presume that the expected child of Elizabeth wife of Lewis Hancock, was Sarah Lee Hancock who died prior to 1856, as on that date William Nelson Robinson, of Scottsboro, Ala. qualified as administrator of the estate giving a bond in the sum of \$2500. The record shows that she died in the State of Texas.

The Dr. Haynes mentioned was the Dr. William O. Haynes, whose middle name was probably Oglesby, son of Stephen and Nancy Oglesby, the latter being a stepdaughter of Lewis Hancock, the mother Julia Ann Hancock, a sister of Phoebe Hancock, your ancestress.

I think you would find it most interesting and enlightening if you would carefully abstract the Hancock Records of Bastrop County, securing complete copies of the wills, brief abstracts of deeds and other documents, and the marriage records, for it is likely that the marriage records will give you the date of the birth of the various persons in which we are interested. After you have done this, if you will send them to me I can complete my skeleton records of the family.

I would like very much to have the record and names of all the descendants of Phoebe (Hancock) Bryan Phoebe Peyton's husband. I must have said before.

The years 1855 and 56.

I am looking forward with pleasure to receiving the additional information which you stated you would send me, and when you write, I would appreciate your giving me the date of William R. Hancock's will and the date it was probated. Dear Mrs. Proctor:

Thank you for your kind letter. I hope by this time Mr. Proctor is well on his way to recovery by this time. It was very nice of you to bother answering when you have such problems of your own.

When your time permits I should like to get any data on the Hancocks that you might have. In the interim I will outline what data I have on this family:

John Allen Hancock was born c 1780 in Franklin or Fluvanna Co, Va. and died Jan. 1856 in Jackson Co, Ala. He was married Nov. 2, 1801 to Sarah Ryan, a native of Bedford Co Va. He moved to Alabama before 1824 and practiced law at Bellefonte. In 1839 he advertised for sale land where he resided nine miles north of Bellefonte. In 1822 ~~was~~ one of the Commissioners for selecting County seat of Jackson Co was John Hancock. He died intestate but his estate was probated July 26, 1856 (Will book 1 p563)

Dear Mrs. Proctor.

Thank you very much for the data you sent. It is of immense help to me, particularly the tombstone record of John Hancock which I am sure is John Allen Hancock.

I believe the tombstone should read Franklin Co. Va for both he and his wife. It is a possibility that he was born in Fluvanna Co, Va, where his parents were married in 1778. There never has been a Hawkins Co, Va, to the best of my information.

I presume these graves must have been on what was once the Hancock homestead. Is there any trace of a house there? On June 29, 1839 John A. Hancock advertised in the Huntsville Democrat "the land where I reside nine miles north of Bellefonte, Jackson Co, Ala". This must not be the same place.

I have no family Bible Bible. Most of my Hancock data comes from miscellaneous sources for the Ala. and Texas part - some quite confusing. The Va data is all from W. L. Hopkins Hopkins Family of Va. which has a lot of data on John A.'s father - Lewis and grandfather John.

I don't know anything about Sarah Ryan except that Hopkins says her ^{father} was an early sheriff of Franklin Co, Va. - married Wm Ryan, and that he is same Wm Ryan who married Sarah Swanson April 13, 1760 Goochland Co, Va as shown in the Douglass Register. Sarah Swanson was the

the daughter of Wm Swanson (1720-1804) and Mary Mc Guire d 1811. of Va. and Ga. This is based on Hopkins and I have no other proof. — the name Wm Ryan is not an uncommon name and there may be several of the name. I do not know anything about any Indian blood but ~~it~~ it wouldn't hurt my feelings to find it.

I don't know where John Hancock was in 1850 but I would suspect if not in Jackson Co, Ala he would be in Bastrop Co, Texas, where his widowed daughter ^{Phoebe} lived, where his two sons Lewis and Wm R had just died and near where his sons John and George were living. I haven't had the census record searched but will try to get it done sometime.

I know nothing of Field Allen Hancock's children.

He and a Daniel R Peyton served in Ala. Legislature in early days.

Your guess that we are descended from the John Hancock fascinated me because my grand mother told me the same thing. Later I found the John had no descendants at least of the ~~his~~ name of Hancock. The John father of Lewis and grandfather of John Allen lived at same time as the original John but lived in Goodland Co. Va from ~~1755~~ 1755 to 1785. when he moved to Henry later Patrick Co, Va where he died in 1802.

One source says he was a Rev. soldier (DAR Lineage Book #114 p. 3.). John Hancock was a very common name in Virginia and there were at least 5 or 6 of the same name living at same time. Here again one must be careful and trace lineage only on basis of wills and deeds etc. I haven't completely proved the line but I believe that it is sound.

I have tried to trace the origin of my John but early Virginia records are so scanty in the eastern Counties that it seems to be impossible unless some other old tombstone turns up like the one you found for me.

Thank you for the interest in my (Wm Westby?) Peyton who is the most elusive man I ever ran across. I have no more data on him except that he was born in Ala 1800-10 and was probably dead by Dec. 10, 1850. His children were born between 1832-1842 at least. No record has been found of him in Texas. He had no service record in Mexican War. His descendants have no knowledge of him whatever. My grand mother who was his granddaughter claimed to know nothing whatever about him although she knew his children one of whom Mary Upchurch was a close neighbor. I am beginning to suspect he was a black sheep.

When you get to the Court house, would you see if you can find any Peyton Wills - Daniel R.'s might be there to see if any son who might be my man is mentioned?

I am very glad to hear your husband is recuperating satisfactorily. My best wishes for his rapid improvement.

I have a lot of Hancock references; let me know if you are of this line and would like copies.

She made the trip safely to his home but learned of his death and on her return home, her horse became frightened by a band of Yankee soldiers and ran into a fence making her a cripple for the rest of her life. She died young and never married.

Dear grandson and Grand-Daughter:

It is with pleasure that I undertake to answer your interesting letter announcing your marriage to a Miss Rogers, and of course she did not have to change her name, I am glad that you made choice of one of the good old names of Rogers. I assure you that you did not marry kinfolks, for my father, George Rogers, was the only child of his father William, for whom I was named. He, William Rogers was in the war of 1812, lost his health and died in 1816, when my father was six months old. So his family is the only descents of William Rogers. Your Uncle Cicero is a splendid type of my father, George Rogers. Rogersville was named for Joe Rogers, who owned the first hotel in that town. Joe Rogers was a brother of George Rogers, my great-grand-father, whose home was five miles to Roberville, Tennessee. My father was born in that community the 24th day of October 1816. My father's mother was a very beautiful woman, her maiden name was Bettie Gonce, a better and more useful woman was not to be found in that country. Her father Issac Gonce emigrated to Jackson County, Alabama in about 1818, when my father was about three years old. Old grand-father ~~was~~ Gonce brought Bettie Rogers and little boy, George, to Alabama with his family of seven other daughters and sons. At that time there was a great migration to Alabama and South Tennessee and our people settled along the Tennessee and Alabama line, in fact the state line ran through the community in which our kinfolk settled. Some on one side and some on the other side of the line and yet they were neighbors. My grand-mother three years after she emigrated to Alabama, was married to James B. Matthews, and they had a large family of sons and daughters, but not one is living. James B. Matthews was a very prominent man in his community was quite wealthy in land and negroes. It was the ambition of all the Matthews of that generation to own negroes.

Now I have given you a brief sketch of the Rogers side of the house and will bring up the other side up. Sam McCrary and a very beautiful girl named Betty Allen of precious memory, were married when they were quite young. I am very glad to tell you they were my grand-father and grand-mother. My dear grand-mother died in 1831, two weeks after her child was born, which child was a girl and was named Bruzie, for whom I named my daughter Bruzie. There were 12 children born to them and the first born was William born in 1806. When his father was 18 years old my great-grand-father, Nias Allen, father of my grand-mother Bettie was a soldier in the war of the Revolution 1776. Allens were very fine people and were well to do, in fact were wealthy in lands and negroes. My dear precious mother was of the McCrary family. Your father Sam Rogers, is the best type of my grand-father, Sam McCrary, however, grand-father had as fine head and face as I ever saw on any man; but your father is the best likeness of anyone of his descendents. Grand-father McCrary was a splendid farmer, owned a fine farm and never needed anything, always had plenty at home, was at home nearly all the time was never at his county cite was never in a court house, never had a case in court in all his life of 87 years. He had a second family by his last wife, five children were born to them but they have all gone the way of all earth, as his first children have gone. I have so far given your connection on the Rogers side, and the Allens and McCrary's and a little sketch of the Matthews side. But I will give your connection with one of the greatest families of Middle Tennessee, Sherod Williams was the husband

of Polly Leoney. They were my wife's grand-father and grand-mother. They had 21 children, 17 sons and four daughters, 20 of them lived to be grown. ~~They~~ I knew about half of them. Great-grand-father Williams died ~~there~~ ~~five~~ five hundred miles from home in 35 and was buried there ~~there~~ but five years after his death two of his sons went and brought his remains home and laid his body to rest by the side of his dear companion, who had some years before also passed away. I visited their graves before I left that country. The inscription was: "I heard a voice from heaven saying, Blessed is the dead that die in the Lord, yea saith the Spirit, from henceforth they rest from their labors and their works doth follow them". They were Old Baptist. The Williams brothers and sisters had quite a success in life and two of them, Nat, and Jim, were public men. Nat was in the Tennessee legislature when war between States came up, and his vote defeated the bill to arm the States you see he was not in favor of the war, in fact, he made a speech against going into war. Jim Williams who married Kate Tally, over in Jackson County, Alabama on the Tennessee River represented his county in the legislature a number of times. Of the three members that went to the legislature from OLD HIGH Jackson as it was called Jim Williams was the middle man and was named the "Average Hog", and that was his nickname as long as he lived. He was a Methodist, Nat Williams was a Cumberland Presbyterian. Jennie a favorite sister of the family of sons married Jerry Matthews, ~~the~~ the father and mother of my first wife Sarah Ann Matthews, who was born April the second, 1857. Her father Jerry Matthews, lived a neighbor to my father when I was born in May the 14th, 1847. ~~My~~ My mother said Jerry Matthews was one of the best neighbors she ever lived by. He was very wealthy in negroes and lands, He died in 1847 when his daughter Sarah was 10 years old. Jerry and Jennie as they were called had a family of three sons and three daughters. They were Methodist & Presbyterians, with the exception of my wife, who came from the Presbyterians to Old Baptist in June 1872, just before we left for Texas the following September, 10 years ago next September. The Allen's with the exception 4 & 5 were Free Will Baptist. Grand-father William Rogers was Old Baptist and his wife, my father's mother, who was the widow of James B. Matthews was Old Baptist, also her mother Francis Gonce whose maiden name was Francis Wilson, was an Old Baptist, you see I am bringing up your connection with a fine old family named Wilson.

Francis Wilson Gonce was my father's grand-mother. She is another of our people of precious memory. She was a member of Crow Creek Church, which was organized at least 100 years ago. I visited her tomb when I visited the Church meetings of long ago. A greater woman in the community to the sick and those that were in distress, never lived in all that country than Aunt Frankie Gonce as she was called by her friends and neighbors. That large Gonce family have all since passed away. I will now give you a short sketch of my father's family. My oldest sister Betty Madlan who is about 80 is rather active at that age. She was first born, I was second born, May 14, 1839, therefore I was 94 last May. I joined the Old Baptist Church in October 1868 in Alabama was married to Sarah Gover (Matthews) in November 26, 1860. Ten children were born to us 9 are living and getting along in this world fairly well. I was ordained to the ministry in an Old Baptist church in 1872 in Franklin County, Tennessee 30 years ago. My brother Sam who passed away a short time ago who was nearly 80 years old and five sisters were and are Old Baptist. I saw my dear father baptized many years ago

Brother Jim had a dream the night before he was killed in the great battle and wanted to relate the dream to brother Sam; but they were arranging everything to go into battle so brother Sam would not take time to hear the dream, ~~ixxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ and after the battle brother Jim regretted very much that he did not hear the dream. It was imagined that he had a presentiment of his death in his dream. Before I close this scribble I will give you a caution on religion the world religion, you perhaps do not understand the difference between the religion of the world and the religion of Christ and his Apostles. It cost more to support the religion of the World than it does to support the government of the world. When you hear preachers begging notice the contrast between them and the Saviour, who for our sake became poor, that we through his poverty might be rich. "The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the son of man hath not where to lay his head". He was a very poor man, but you will never find in all the New Testament that he ever begged for money. The old adage is; "To work and I am too busy to beg I am not ashamed".

The Rogers family seems to have arrived on Crow Creek Valley with or near same time - ARNOLDS, WILLIS, MATTHEWS, SUMMERS, GAMBOLS, LOONEYS, and WILLIAMS, about 1820 - 1830. I have not checked the census to be exact.

I am leaving the father and mother of Rogers family blank until find out their names and are identified. They might have come from Hawkins County, Tennessee to Jackson County, Alabama.

The Census record I have only shows William (the father) I believe the wife and children were left off by the person copying this record, and should be rechecked for correctness to show the rest of this family listed so it could at least be partly identified. They had at least nine children. The 1850 census of Jackson County, Alabama shows many of the children. He came from East Tennessee probably Hawkins County, to Kentucky where some of the children were born thence to Franklin County, Tennessee. (See 1830 Census of Franklin Co., Tenn.) Thence to Jackson County, Alabama. (See 1840 Census of Jackson County, Ala.) I have no record of his wife, she is not mentioned in any record that I have found. The 1840 Census of Jackson County, Alabama shows his family but not him, seems he must have died before 1840. I notice in J. R. Kennamer's History of Jackson County, Alabama, that he mentions an early settler, William Rogers living near Anderson, Tenn., and Bass Station, Alabama and that would be in the Pleasant Grove Community, (see note of History on other pages) which was an early settlement on Crow Creek. There is some question about the father's name of these children. I think William is the father, others think that John might be, research is needed as I believe this question can be settled by a recheck of the census and get all the information on this family as recorded (which has been omitted which I am not conveniently able to do at this time. I have in my records one John Rogers, (1830 census) from either Franklin or Jackson Counties).

This is only clue that William Rogers might be the parents of these children. He is listed in Franklin County, 1830 census but moved to Jackson County, Alabama. His family is listed in 1840 census in Jackson County, but he is not, so he must have died in Alabama before 1840. I am unable to find any record of William Roger's wife.

I do not know the connection between the above George Rogers mentioned here and the George Rogers who came to Alabama. Larkin Willis mentioned here is the father of Samuel Willis who settled in Jackson County, Alabama during 1823.

ROREX of Northern Alabama.

James K. P. Rorex, M. D. Physician and Surgeon, son of David and Sarah A. (Wilkinson) Rorex, was born the 3rd of March - 1845, in Fayetteville, Lincoln County, Tennessee. His father David Rorex, was born in East Tenn., October 16, 1806. He was a merchant and moved to Alabama in January 1858, and died in Scottsboro, March 1880. His wife, Sarah Ann Wilkinson, died March 1863. They had six children - two boys - four girls.

Dr. Rorex received a common school education at Stevenson in the antebellum days. He entered the Confederate Army at the age of 15 in the 6th Ala. Inf. He was in the seven days fight before Richmond in 1862; at the battle of Chancellorsville where he was wounded; at Gettysburg and the second battle of the Wilderness, where he received a wound which crippled him for five or six years. After the war, he attended school at Stevenson for one year. Then he went to the University of Virginia, after which he came home and taught school for three years, studying medicine in the meantime. He attended two courses of lectures in Nashville; took his degree of M. D. at Mobile in March 1875; attended La. State Medical College in New Orleans in 1884 and has practiced medicine in Scottsboro since 1875 (?) Should be 1885 ?

He is a member of the State Medical association and a counsellor there in since 1881; was County Health Officer five years and is President now of Jackson Co., medical Society. He is a member of the Christian Church and of the Odd Fellows Fraternity. Married November 6 - 1876 to Ella Ann Whitworth, a daughter of Wm. Whitworth of Tenn. They have three children - Louis Wyeth - Fannie Polk and William David. (Dr. James K. P. Rorex, died or committed suicide (?) when ?)

Fort Dearborn was erected in August 1803 - It was erected by Command under Lieut. James Strode SWEARINGNE, of SHEPHERDSTOWN, Jefferson County, West Virginia. And how do we know?

The history of the site of CHICAGO goes back deep into the story of the ambitious of France. As early as 1671 France took possession of the vast lands of the Great Lakes and the West, LaSalle, Joliet, Marquette, Hennepin, and others came and departed. Marquette even built a cabin on the south fork of the "Che-kakou" river, but after all Detroit remained the place where gathered all the picturesque life of an opening world.

But at two o'clock on the afternoon of Wednesday, the 17th of August, 1803, as proven by an old journal still extant, a little column of sixty-five men in uniform of the young United Army halted on the banks of the river, a half mile above its mouth. A breeze blew in from Lake Michigan and the waves were white on a bar at the river's mouth. In command stood Lieut. SWEARINGEN.

JAMES STRODE SWEARINGEN, was born Feb. 3, 1782, at Shepherdstown. He was a son of CAPT. JOSIAH and PHOEBE (Strode) SWEARINGEN, and the grandson of Col. (King's) VAN SWEARINGEN, an early (1734) settler of Shepherdstown, who held the office of County Lieutenant during the Colonial and Revolutionary period and descendant of that "puait" character, Gerrit V. Swearingen, who came to America from Holland, in 1654, became prominent in the affairs of the Dutch colony, at New Amstel (New Castle) Delaware; and after the surrender to the British in 1664, removed to St. Mary's county, Maryland, where he became equally prominent. In 1800 he was commissioned an Ensign in the First Artillerists and Engineers, the only regiment of Artillery then in the army.

On January 25, 1803, he was promoted by Secretary of War Dearborn to a Lieutenancy in the First Artillerists, and on March 9th, of the same year, was ordered to proceed to Detroit, there to join Capt. Peter Tallman's company. The young officer packing up a few books on fortifications started for the northwest. He stopped at Chillicothe, then the capital of the new State of Ohio, to visit his brother-in-law THOMAS WORTHINGTON a West Virginian, who had just been elected to the United States Senate, and later became Gov. of Ohio.

Leaving Chillicothe, April 23, 1803, accompanied by two Indians for guides Swearingen began his journey through the wilderness to Detroit. He had not progressed far until the Indians deserted and he was forced to push on alone, reaching his destination on May 8th.

He had not been in Detroit long when on July 14th he was detached from his company and placed in immediate command of Capt. John Whistler's company of First Infantry and directed to proceed to the mouth of the Chicago river, there to erect a fort.

Capt. Whistler accompanied by his wife, their three year old son, George, afterwards a distinguished engineer in the RUSSIAN SERVICE - and their eldest son, William - an officer in the same regiment planned to start for Chicago by way of the lake, on board the United States schooner, Tracy. The plans miscarried.

LIEUT. SWEARINGEN, although only twenty-one years old, was started overland on a march of 362 miles, through vast forests, with a detachment of sixty-five men, three pieces of artillery, and a wagon train. The young officer wrote down the story of his march, which along with many other records, has been preserved by Captain Robert S. Franklin, great grandson of CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA.

Huron

The little command foiled an Indian trail which led from Detroit across the Huron near Ypsilanti, ran west across the Grande and the Kalamazoo rivers near their heads. It then swung southwest to the St. Joseph, not far above Miles, Michigan, thence with the river to the lake shore to the Chicago river. August 16th found the command marching thirty-three miles and "encamped on the Little Calamac (Calumet) River". And then comes an entry of the greatest historical importance.

Wednesday, August 17th- Proceeded on our march at 6 O'clock A. M. 24 miles and encamped on the Chicago river at 2 o'clock P. M. The river is about 30 yards wide where the garrison is intended to be built, and from 18 ft. and upward deep dead water owing to its being stopped up at the mouth by the washing of the sand from the lake. The water is not fit to use. The bank where the fort is to be built is about eight feet high and a half a mile above mouth. The opposite bank is not so high, not being a difference of more than two feet, by appearances. The banks above are quite low. The distance from Detroit to the mouth of St. Joseph is 272 miles; from the mouth of St. Joseph to Chicago, 90 miles, making in whole 362 miles. "The portage from the Chicago river so as to get into the MISSISSIPPI River which is about four hundred miles from the lake or the mouth of the river Chicago. This portage is six miles above the mouth and a short distance across, into a small creek, which discharges itself into the river; fifteen miles from this place at a village; from thence little small lakes and creeks, until intersected by the Illinois river, from thence into the Mississippi, in the spring or time of high water, small craft may pass without any sand carriage. So concludes the "Remarks on the Way from Chillicothe to Chicago". Written over a century ago by the young artillery lieutenant of twenty-one.

It is to be regretted from an historical point of view that Lieut. Swearingen did not continue his journey and give a description of the erection of old Fort Dearborn. Other documents were loaned to an historical society in Chicago, and destroyed in the fire of 1871. Here also might have been found the answer to the long mooted question of the movements of Capt. Whistler during the years 1803-1804. But promptly on arrival the soldiers began the erection of the fort. Timbers were cut and hauled with ropes.

The plans of Whistler to leave Detroit on the Tracy to sail by lake seem clearly to have miscarried. Various authorities agree that Whistler did not reach Chicago until June 1804. The general returns of the Army show that the fort was garrisoned from June 1, 1804 to June 1812, by a company of First Infantry, commanded most of the time by Capt. Whistler. It is possible that SWEARINGEN returned to Detroit by the same boat as in a letter dated "Chickasaw Bluffs", April 1804, 6th he recites that "I left Detroit June last." Capt. Thos. G. Anderson, U.S.A., testified that during 1804 Capt. Whistler, "came to take possession at Chicago", or a year after SWEARINGEN had already established the fort at that point on which grew the city of CHICAGO. This out of the rude collection of cabins, set down in swamps around Fort Dearborn came a great city. Which was started by a West Virginian. Among the citizens of the city to come were many from West Virginia. And today West Virginia takes its place with a little more than ordinary interest and pride in lending its support to the exposition of what a CENTURY of PROGRESS has brought to CHICAGO and our people, ever keeping in mind the part played in its history by - Colonel JAMES STROLE SWEARINGEN.

My dear Miss Rutherford; Of course we are cousins! But I guess you think I am
an awfully slow one. I have been away from Washington, down in Alabama, most
three months at home of my brother, Dr. James Rutherford, he has a very bad case
of Angina and we are very anxious about him. So I have had to drop history a bit.
Did you ever hear of our Col. Robert Rutherford, born in Nottoway in 1734, lived
in Chatham county N. C. during the Revolution, 1752 married Dorothy Ann Brooks,
died in Newberry, S. C. 1814. Children; John; Robert; Thomas; Mary (Mathis);
Dorothy (Carter); etc., wonder if this very Robert was my grandfather who married
a Miller in S. C. ? Do wish I had sense to or money to unravel all this. It seems
so very near the surface. I haven't felt well this summer and with the extreme heat
we are having its hard to exert oneself even to go as far as Winchester.
The Wood connection with my family was that Mary Rutherford married Col. James
Wood, my father's aunt. (She could have been a gr, gr, aunt but impossible to
have been aunt-crb.) We have so much Rutherford history that we have copied from

kitchen waiting for his dinner. The host and hostess sauntering in the direction of where the sly old member of Congress was comfortably seated, soon made the discovery, much to their chagrin, but to the intense amusement of RUTHERFORD.

"The Three Morrors," brother-in-law of Rumsey, of course were there, likewise were John Mark, Thomas White, David Gray, BENONI SWEARINGEN and other prominent citizens, now forgotten.

According to dates, it looks as tho a great deal of deducting will have to be figured out, as we find THOMAS RUTHERFORD, living in Frederick County, Virginia, 1734 - 50., and this is what puzzles me ! BENJAMIN & ROBERT RUTHERFORD, sworn in as deputy sheriffs 1743 - 44.

Note - If ROBERT RUTHERFORD, born 1734, was son of THOMAS RUTHERFORD & Sarah de Montargi -s, who was the ROBERT & BENJAMIN RUTHERFORD, L&A#*X, as by date of birth 1734, it rules out ROBERT of above, as he in 1744 would be only 9 years old.

Tho we have proof that JOHN, THOMAS HUGH, BENJAMIN and ROBERT were brothers-in-law of James Wood, and JAMES WOOD, died in 1759 - Therefore and we find that BENJAMIN RUTHERFORD, was married 1744. RUTHERFORD.

Name has had many variations through the Centuries.

RUTHERFORD is the usual form of the name varied in some communities as
RUTHERFURD.

The name has passed through any number of variations, all along the centuries,
the family being one of the OLDEST in the "LAND OF BRUCE".
According to tradition, early annals of SCOTLAND mention KING RUTHER as the one
responsible for the name. THIS was way back in that age of the world called
"Times Immemorial."

As a rule when appeal is made to that classic epoch no one is rash enough to
argue regarding the pros and cons of the subject.

KING RUTHER'S date is not at hand. Suffice it to say that "RUTHERFORD", as a
Family Name is found in ANCIENT RECORDS, with numberless variants.

For example;

RUTHIRFURD, (RETTERRFORD, RATHERFORD, RUTHERFORD), RUTHIRFORLE, RUTHERFOORD,
Ruthirford, Rulysfurd, Rodysforde, not to omit Rutherford. In this country
where branches of the family settled in the Colonial period the names is,
RUTHERFORD or Rutherford; (Retterford; Ratherford.)

Note - the R's in (), the bracket above, were added by Mrs. G.M.P. as found to be true
in (American research of archives.)

(Snyder data to C.R.B.)

Fairnington in Roxburghshire, Scotland, and Edgerston are names of Ancient homes
of the RUTHERFURDS. Edgerston is also the name chosen for several homes of the
family in America.

ANCIENT AND POWERFUL.

For Centuries RUTHERFURDS have been classed among the most ancient and powerful
families in TEVIOTDALE, on the borders of ENGLAND.

They have intermarried with Royal Families and have inherited HONORS and had
honors conferred upon them. One can read of the family in the "HISTORY OF
ROXBURGHSHIRE", in BURKE'S LANDED GENTRY, Nisbeth's HERALDRY and PEDIGREE of
SCOTLAND. The RUTHERFURDS were seated in KIRKCULEBRIGHTSHIRE, also at RUMERGLAN
an Ancient burgh of LANARKSHIRE, erected into a ROYAL burgh by KING DAVID, 1126.
Walter Scott's mother was ANN RUTHERFORD.

A NEW JERSEY ESTATE.

New Jersey has a COLONIAL ESTATE, which is considered one of the finest in the country. "TRANQUILLITY" is the name given to it when it became the home of a branch of the "RUTHERFORD, or Rutherford, family, JOHN RUTHERFORD and his wife HELENA MORRIS. According to the story handed down in the family, after a tedious journey over rough roads from New York when their home was reached, Mrs. RUTHERFORD, exclaimed, "This is indeed tranquility," and "TRANQUILLITY" it has been from that time to this. JOHN RUTHERFORD was son of WALTER RUTHERFORD, who was born in SCOTLAND, son of SIR JOHN RUTHERFORD, who was sixteenth in descent from HUGO de RUTHERFORD, a SCOTTISH BARON, 1225 A.D. Walter came to New York in 1756 and married Catherine, daughter of James Alexander, grandson of LORD STERLING (Titular Lord Sterling) or Major General William Alexander, of the ~~####~~ Continental army. Titles seem to flourish along about this epoch, in the RUTHERFORD and Allied Families. John's wife, Helena Morris, was one of four daughters of Lewis Morris, signer of the Declaration of Independence, there were also six sons in the Morris family. John and Helena were married on October 30, 1782, at "Society Hall," the Morris country estate in Hunterdon county, N. J. To return to Walter, born in Scotland, he entered the Army at 15 years of age, and was lieutenant of the Royal Scots. Ordered to America with his regiment, he was in active service until the close of the French and Indian war, displaying great gallantry. He had a brother, Baron ROBERT RUTHERFORD, his title came to him from THE EMPRESS CATHERINE II, of RUSSIA. He was thus honored on account of valuable services rendered to Russia during a war with Turkey. He was offered the position of superintendent of the Treasury of St. Petersburg, an honor that he declined. The title and dignity of a baron of Russia, an honor conferred by Catherine, he accepted and also the present of a gold snuff box set with diamonds and rubies. Also, so it is said, the addition of a second motto to the family armorial bearing was added at her request.

THE FAMILY MOTTO.

The RUTHERFORD motto or legend, from the first use by the family has been "nec sorte, nec fato. - neither by chance nor by fate." The added legend was "~~Sed~~ ~~per~~ ~~terras~~." "Sed labore et ardore." Another family legend is "Permare per terras," "by sea, by land." This is in use by some branches of the Rutherford family. Still another motto, "Amicus fidus ad aras." Religiously faithful to your friend."

The Martlet, a footless marten, or swallow, is a fabulous bird.

Obviously, it is fabulous. The legs have short tufts of feathers instead of feet. It is one of the marks of cadency and designates the fourth son of a family. To return to John Rutherford, son of Major Walter, John was born in 1760 and, as said above, became owner of a handsome estate, "TRANQUILLITY". He was one of the great landed proprietors of New Jersey. After his graduation from Princeton College, he studied law. His mother as already said, was born Alexander. Catherine Alexander. She was the widow PARKER, when she became the wife of Walter Rutherford, son of Sir John Rutherford.

HEITMAN'S "Officers of the American Revolution" lists Capt. John Rutherford, of Pennsylvania; also Samuel of the same State, who was with the Flying Camp from July 1776-1780, and Maj. John; Col. Robert and Brigadier Gen. Griffith Rutherford each of North Carolina. In 1739 Griffith of North Carolina it is stated came to America with his father GRIFFITH RUTHERFORD, Sr., son of John Rutherford, of Scotland and wife Miss GRIFFITH, born in Wales. The brigadier general had an active career as well as a patriotic one. He was member of Provincial Congress that met at Halifax, April 1, 1776. The year before, 1775, he had also been a member of the Congress.

RECORDS OF FAMILY.

In 1804, records of the Rutherford family were published. It was compiled by Livingston Rutherford, principally as is stated in the preface, "from original manuscripts in Rutherford collection." The "Walker Family of Virginia" pub. in 1902, is another valuable record and the West Virginia Historical Magazine has data of interest. The Walker Family of Virginia is of Scottish ancestry.

The coat-of-arms here pictured was the original grant and as was the case in armorial bearings, in the early days of heraldry, it is not elaborate, although it has crest and motto. The Lord Rutherfords, Earls of TEVIOT, have the same shield, but the coat is a mermaid, with comb and mirror and the motto, Per mare per terras". *****

ARCHIBALD H. RUTHERFORD. Published by - The Arkansas Historical Association, FAYETTEVILLE, ARKANSAS.

Archibald Hamilton Rutherford, pioneer of Arkansas, was the son of ARCHIBALD RUTHERFORD and MARGARET MASSIE PARRISH (daughter of Booker Parrish and Constance Massie Parrish, of Goochland County, Virginia.), and the grandson of WILLIAM RUTHERFORD, who was born in EDGERSTON, SCOTLAND, and came to AMERICA about 1716. He landed in Pennsylvania and with his brother Thomas, migrated to Virginia in 1747, (Note - these dates are all later than those given on THOMAS of Winchester, Va. and settled in Goochland County, Va., where he died about 1801. WILLIAM RUTHERFORD, married Ursula Parrish, daughter of HUMPHREY PARRISH and wife MARY, they had nine children, their son Archibald Rutherford, was born in Goochland county, Va., Feb. 28, 1766, (If born in 1766, how could he have served in the Rev. War? C.R.E.) and was married to Margaret Massie Parrish (his cousin) on December 6, 1791. She, (Margaret Massie Parrish, was born on March 18, 1774). He moved from Virginia to Goosecreek, Tennessee, in 1805, and died March 25, 1825. They had eleven children, several of whom left Tennessee and migrated to Arkansas and Texas. Among these children were Archibald H. Rutherford, born Nov. 11, 1811, and his brother SAMUEL MORTON RUTHERFORD, who came to Arkansas. Samuel served in the war of 1812 under Gen. Jackson, at the Battle of New Orleans, in 1817 he came to Arkansas Post; (Oldest settlement in Ark.) he was prominently indentified with the history of Arkansas - Living most of the time at Ft. Smith until his death, April 1, 1867.

ARCHIBALD RUTHERFORD grew up on the family plantation in Tennessee, he received the best education which the country afforded, but at the age of 19 years the urge to go West young man proved to strong for him and on December 15, 1830

he set out on horse back from Goosecreek, Tennessee to join his brother Samuel at Arkansas Post. He arrived there on February 14, 1831, and lived there until Nov. 5th, when he went to Clark County, Arkansas, where he lived for nine years. In Clark County, he engaged in merchandising in cooperation with Mr. Jacob Barkman at Greenville, Ark., now Hollywood, and he also studied law. In 1833 he was elected Clerk of Supreme Court.

HERE IS SOME OTHER DATA WHICH PROVES THE RELATIONSHIP OF HOUSTON, and how it comes into the RUTHERFORD picture of my own family.

PHILIP PITMAN, married Mary, daughter of Capt. GEO. HOUSTON, Rev. Officer from Rockingham County, Va. Philip was a soldier in the War of 1812 when but a youth.

At the age of 64 he entered the "Stonewall" Brigade with his sons, JOHN ANTHONY -D: and NATHAN. He served as state senator from Shenandoah from 1846 to the out-

break of the Civil War. It was through his untiring efforts that the state supported the extension of the Manassas Gap railroad through Shenandoah county, sub-

scribe the funds so the road could be built. To do so he had to overcome great opposition. He was a leading man of his county, and took an active interest in

promoting the public good. He was a large slave holder, and was engaged in farm-

ing and in lumbering. From Port Republic on the South Fork and from "Red Banks" on the North Fork he yearly sent boats loaded with the products of this region

via the waters of the Shenandoah and Potomac rivers to Alexander. Mr. Pitman was an elder in the Presbyterian Church in Woodstock. When GEN. SAM HOUSTON

spoke at a Democratic rally and barbecue near "Red Banks" he was entertained at "PALMYRA", the home of SENATOR PITMAN, whose wife was a cousin of the GENERAL.

1740 - NICHOLAS PITMAN - from Rhine Valley came to America. He lived north of Strasburg on the Cedar Creek in Shenandoah County. His wife was CATHARINE,

daughter of the vestryman Lawrence SNAPP. Their son John Pitman settled in the West. His son Lawrence Pitman, born 1772 became a man of affairs in his commu-

nity being the builder and manager of the Red Banks mill and a tavern nearby a famous hostelry in the days of teamsters and stage coaches. Upon his estate of

several thousand acres, in 1802 he erected as his home the handsome brick dwell-

ing now standing upon the Valley Pike and overlooking the Shenandoah River, where he reared five sons; PHILIP, ANDREW, LAWRENCE, JR., JOSEPH, & JOHN, and five

daughters; Mrs. Catherine CARTER; Mrs. Susan Carter; ie SUSAN PITMAN, married JOHN CARTER, JR., who reared my grandfather, JOHN RUTHERFORD. Mrs. Bettie CARTER;

Mrs. Mary Ripley; and Mrs. Dickenson; NOTE - all these sisters married CARTERS, and all closely related. Lawrence PITMAN, SR., had ten grandsons in the (CONFED-

ERATE) Confederate army. The estate RED BANKS, extended almost to Edinburg on both sides of the VALLEY PIKE, across the Shenandoah and east and northward

along the Massanutten Mountain.

JOSEPH PITMAN, married ANNEBA, daughter of Jared C. Williams - His grandson, Scot Holland Goodnight, is dean of Wisconsin Univ. . . son of Susan Pitman, daughter of Joseph - they moved West leaving Sue with her aunt SUSAN PITMAN CARTER, and my great, great uncle, JOHN CARTER, JR., she lived with them until her aunt's death at the old Carter place known as "Pleasant Level", four miles n. of Winchester, Va., and part of the land which my grandfather, JOHN PITMAN inherited, and which we inherited from our grandfather, and where I was born, and my father also.

John Pitman, graduated in medicine at the Univ. of Va. and practiced in Memphis Tennessee.

Lawrence Pitman, Jr., has a son REV. Frank Pitman, Williamsburg, Va., a son Dr. Wm. Pitman, well known physician in Lynchburg, Va., a grandson, Dr. Roy K. Flanagan, now on State Board of Health, Richmond, Va.

SUSAN PITMAN, daughter of PHILIP PITMAN & MARY HOUSTON, married my great uncle, JAMES WILLIAM RUTHERFORD, (uncle James) Yes great uncle of "CARILLA RUTHERFORD BARDENAR. He, James, eldest son of my grandfather, JOHN HENRY RUTHERFORD, sons of JOHN RUTHERFORD AND MARY SUGAN CARTER.

which I will copy and send to her. For years she and others have been working on their Rutherford Lines. You recall that this James was a brother of my Archibald (b. 1766 in Va) a Red. Sold. who settled in Coake Co. Tenn. and died there 1814 - Relatives here think since his wife was left alone, that she went to her daughter Marie (Mrs Thomas J. Wood) died at her home in Seattsboro - and is buried in the Wood Cove Cemetery where Marie is buried.

Her name was Barbara and I have never found her maiden name. They

must have married 1787 or 2
as Barbara does not begin
to sign deeds with her
husband, until that date.

I have a number of
Deeds from them, both
selling & buying, in Shenan-
doah Co. Va. I obtained
these from the Archives
in Richmond, Va. Barbara
died in 1824, 10 yrs. after
her husband's death.

One thing strange to me
is that Marie m. in 1818,
had 15 children, — and never
named one of her daughters
for her mother. Not even
the middle name, that I can
find, — nor did she name a
son for her father.

After searching, reading
and writing for 9 or 10
months, at last, I was re-

Reynolds - and they reared a
large family. 4 sons were
Rev. Soldiers, - 3 in Tenn. They
were my Archibald, Julius and
Abraham (I have their Military Records)
Here is the way, I found the
father. Julius applied for a
Pension and in order to identify
himself, had to tell, under oath,
something abt. his own family, -

he stated that when he was released from Prison and honorably discharged (I have this record) that he married in Tenn. took his wife and went home to his father in Wythe Co. Va. That a younger bro. was there named, Finney (for a Rev. General), that he & wife lived on a part of the plantation for awhile, - several of their chil. were born here. Later, he took his family, returned to Tenn. settled in Anderson Co. (where he died in 1831) His wif. got his Pension after his death. How the above words "did ring in my ears." In a short time I had the father's name, John Rutherford, b. in Va. 1789 - died at the age of 100 yrs. in 1789. However, he willed everything to a gr. son - and my

(over)

Archibald & his wife & sisters (I got nothing. I have copy of his Will). This gr-son was the son of his dau. Sarah - he was such an old man, perhaps they took care of him in his old age (just my imagination, no proof).

And my pd. genealogist in Richmond - wrote me to give up the search, that Archibald's father's name could never be found." And I pd. \$1 to get the Gov. Pension Record from Washington, Dc. Archibald didn't have a Pension, so I had to find and work on the record of his wife, in order to get the father's name.

Here are the names of John & Viola's children: John Jr, Julia, Archibald, Abraham, James - in Ala, Joseph, Kinney, Sarah & Katherine.

I correspond with descendants of John Jr, James, & Joseph - that's plenty

of writing, and copying
records. You see how I am occupied.

I have written to the Judge
of Lawrence Co. S. Car. to try to find
name of Thomas J. Wood's
father - maybe ^{he} left a Will there.

The Wood & Rutherford fam-
ilies in S. Car. - intermarried.

A ? Rutherford married a Miss
Wood - both died leaving 4 orphan
children; an Oliver Wood was
their Guardian. Names were Robert,
Joseph, Moses & Agnes Rutherford.
Oliver may have been related to our
Thomas J. Wood.

I don't know any of the names

Eliza Herndon Green Shook wife of James Keith Shook thought to have been a baby when family moved from Va to Tenn (about 1825) Her father Paschal Green (Glen) - not much to say - so was angry

Eliza H. Shook. Eliza had one full brother Rufus + one half brother Richard Rufus died in Mexican War - Richard in Civil War + neither left a family.

at least Paschal Green married twice (Nathan Grey - "Tall man of Winston" married Mary Fielding) To Teach.

Nathan Green - most prominent of Page 10 family - expert lawyer - son, Nathan Jr., headed many years law dept. at Cumberland University.

His only son, Grafton Green, is chief Justice of Supreme Court of Tenn. (1949) a daughter married Judge Powell. The youngest children of James Pitt Shook & wife, Nina, Henderson Green they went to school after Civil War to "Cousin Jack" Henderson & "Uncle William Shook" (quote Chas Paschal's.) This was one of a school B. L. in 11. dist. and sometimes called "Peed ticks", later called "Widow's".

Lincoln Church (Page 30)

August Protracted meeting (Sat before Sunday began) Camp meetings before Civil War. The camp meetings were not held after Civil War - Cabins torn down - building on a ridge between 2 creeks - Boiling Fork & Normood Creek. These came together about a mile from church. Remember: My father-in-law Ross B. Conroy a deacon - coming from his home 200 yds. away bringing pitcher of water for pulpit & a leaf of oak in his hand. At foot of hill on Boiling Fork side, on Ross B. Conroy place were cold springs. Summer of 1850 having a great revival. Lincoln Church became Cumberland Presbyterian.
