He was a merchant at Bellefonte, and was educated at Springfield, Ohio and Lookout Mt., Tenn., He died at Bellefonte, April 10 - 1872; she married a second time to Jesse Norman in 1877 and resided at Red Bank, Miss. (No issue).

He was educated at Scottsboro, Ala., and Springfield, Ohio; He lived at Bellefonte, until 1879, went to Scottsboro and became clerk in mercantile house of which he later became a partner; returned to his father's farm near Bellefonte in 1885 and there engaged in farming & merchandizing, was Postmaster at Bellefonte in 1893; he removed to Scottsboro and engaged in lumber trade.

Capt. Alex Caldwell, born in Nottingham, N. H. June 27 - 1777, married Hannah # Hamlin, born in Harvard, Mass., July 27 - 1789.

Europe Hamlin, born Pembroke, Mass., Nov. 20 - 1759, married 1st by Rev. Ebenezer Grosvenor, April 13, 1786 to Dorcas Stowe of Harvard, Mass., born Sept. 24 - 1759. She died at Hillsboro, N. H., Aug., 7 - 1813. He died June 7 - 1820.

Major Eleazer Hamlin, born about July 1732 at Wellfleet, then a part of Eastham, Mass., where he was probably born, he married 1st East parish, Bridgewater, Mass., by Rev. John Augier, June 30 - 1752, Lydia Bonney, of Pembroke, Mass., who died Aug. 12 - 1769. He died Dec. 1 - 1807, aged 75 years and 5 months, he is buried by the side of his son Green, in the East burying ground, Westford. The Mass. Colonial records have many references to his military services in the Revolution. He was 2nd Lieut. in the Lexington Alarm Roll of Capt. James Hatch's Co.

Hamlin Caldwell (Brother Of Almena) was born at Hillsboro, New Hampshire, on February 29th, 1812, married near Bellefonte, Alabama, January 9th, 1844 to, Martha Jane, daughter of John and Jane (Long) Snodgrass. (He was known as Capt. John Snodgrass). Martha Jane Snodgrass was born at Bellefonte, Alabama, on February 23rd, 1823. He (Hamlin Caldwell) removed with his parents to Portsmouth, Ohio about 1816-18; Cincinnati, Ohio, 1824-25; later to Springfield Ohio; to Bellefonte, Alabama in 1837; and Scottsboro, Alabama in 1883, he was a Cumberland Presbyterian and died in Scottsboro, September 3rd, 1895.

The parents of the above Hamlin Caldwell were, HANNAH HAMLIN, born Harvard, Mass., July 27, 1789; married probably in New Hampshire, Capt. Alexander Caldwell, he was born in Nottingham, New Hampshire, June 27, 1777; carpenter; Nottingham and Hillsboro, N. H.; removed to Portsmouth, Ohio, about 1817-18. He was made a Mason in Portsmouth Lodge, 1821: his Masonic apron is still preserved in the family. They were Presbyterians; he assisted in organizing the first Presbyterian church in Portsmouth. He and his son George were drowned in the Scioto river, April 10, 1824; she died at Portsmouth, August 15, 1824.

Dear Mrs. Proctor

I am writing you as a member of the CORN Family, or one interested in genealogy, and perhaps you can aid us in tracing our family tree. We beg your help in this quest, by giving your family tree to us, or writing it out and mailing same to us in the self addressed envelope.

We have written a history of the Corn Families of the U.S.A. and have one recorded family in England. This manuscript now has 169 pages and is being added to as we gather more information. We find the Corns in many States of the Union, and the name spelled in many ways besides CORN, like, Corns, Cornn, Corn, Cornes, Coren, Corus, Korn, Kornes, Kearn, Kornes. Those spelling it with a K, emigrated from Germany, Holland, and Denmark, to this country in early days. Others came from England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales. Nearly all of the latter spelled the name with a C. One writer claims some Huguenots came from France and settled in Virginia; among them was a Pierre De Corne, and after arriving here the name was simplified to just "CORN".

The most prominent Corns we have records of are John Peter, Jesse, George and Samuel, whose parents were Mathew and Mollie Corn of Va. All four brothers served in the War of the Revolution; afterwards John Peter and Jesse became Baptist ministers and missionaries, and preached to the Cherokee Indians in the Carolinas, and Georgia. It is very possible that our grandfather, Ambrose Corn, descended from one of these men, as Ambrose was a strict Baptist all his life. I am enclosing page 3 of our manuscript, as it gives about all we now know of our ancestor at this time. This is John Corn, who was raised in Kentucky, married Hanna Spencer (we do not know when or where), but grandfather Ambrose was born in Scott County, Indiana, 1818. Later they were in Johnson County, Indiana, where great grandfather John died in 1837. You will note there were 9 children, but we only have a list of 4, that we tell about. The other 5 are completely lost to us. My father was James Corn, the 4th child of Ambrose and Katherine Corn family.

The second family we have quite a record of was the old Edward E. Corn, who, with his family came from what is now south, West Virginia to Washington County, Ky. in 1875. They settled within 50 miles of the Old George Corn, who in 1780 came down the Ohio river with his 5 sons, from Redstone, now Brownstown, Pa. and settled in Mercer County Ky. See Kentucky, Historical Society Monthly, of Frankfort, Ky; for January 1946, Vol. 44 - No. 146. Or our manuscript, pages 43 to 46. This was written by Attorney, now Mayor, James Franklin Corn of Cleveland, Tenn, in which he says these are probably the Corns who were living in Bedford County, Pa. in 1777. This place is about fifty miles from where the Edward E. Corns came from in Virginia. These two families were probably close related, our family could easily spring from either of these two heads.

We would be very much pleased if you can write up the data of your family as far back as you know, giving the children in rotation, and dates as much as you can, with towns and counties, telling us if you wish it printed in our book. Printing free. Single copies of manuscript can be had if desired. James F. Corn of Cleveland, Tenn. offers \$100 reward to anyone who can furnish him authentic information through the Revolutionary period of the ancestry of Charles Corn, 1801-1871, great grandfather of James F. I received your letter several days ago but I have been too sick to write. Yes it was Mrs. Weaver's desire to go to Jackson, but she was taken down sick next day after she got to Mrs. Chaddicks and never was about any more. Mrs. Weaver came to St. Louis alone, a son of her neice accompanied her to Mrs. Chaddick. Mrs. Weaver's niece (who is very wealthy) bore all of her expenses in coming from Iowa and paid her Drs. bill and her funeral expense. Her casket cost one hundred dollars, it certainly was beautiful, the prettiest for the price that I ever saw, her robe was pretty and fine. Nothing that money could buy was left undone while she lived (after her neice took charge of her) and after she died she was put away handsomely dressed and in a beautiful casket. Mrs. Weaver was well taken care of and she told them of their kindness while she was living. Her death was beautiful for she was not only prepared to die but was anxious that her suffering should end, and talked to us about it. She called all of us her dead by name and asked them (holding out her hand as if for them to take hold of her) to come and help her. I gave her the last dose of medicine she ever took, she said to me, "why do you try to keep me, why don't you let me go". She called Josie and Senia more often than any one but she talked to them all and called them by name. She told Mrs. Chaddick that her brother Stokley was sick and it would be a close rub to tell which would go first. Mrs. Weaver was talking of her brother Stokley Chadick who lived in Texas. As to Mrs. Chaddick she is the widow of William Chadick who was the son of Rev. Wm. Chadick, a brother of Mrs. Weaver. Mrs. Chadick's father died and was buried in Tenn. the year the yellow fever was in Huntsville. When they saw that Mrs. Weaver was worse, they sent for me and I went and staid until she was buried. I visited her before that and made them promise to let me know if she

not want me to leave when I would write you a full description of her sickness and death as I did Mrs. Lizzie McCullough of Parks store, perhaps she has the letter yet and will let you read it. Your aunt did not like for means to get to Jackson, she liked strength and health. She had no money of her own as she spent that with Jim's family, but her ~~rich~~ niece had plenty and spent it lavishly for aunt. Poor Jim did not have the means to come to see his mother. I wish he could have heard her talk a few minutes before she became speechless.

I am afraid Jim made a terrible mistake in his selection for a wife for I always thought him such a good boy. I cannot write more as I am not able though I could tell you lots more.

Thomas Cargill, a pensioner of the Revolutionary War, Certificate No. 25802, Alabama Agency, you are advised the records of this office show that on May 6, 1848, satisfactory evidence was presented to the County Court of Marshall County, Alabama, that the pensioner died on September 10, 1847 in said county and state, and left surviving a widow, Mourning Cargill. The arrears of pension due the decedent, covering the period from March 4, 1847 to September 10, 1847, were paid on May 8, 1848 at the Pension Agency in Huntsville, Alabama to David Ricketts, as attorney for the widow.

Thomas Cargill, soldier of the American Revolution, age not given, a resident of Jackson County; pvt. in Cavalry, N. C. Militia; enrolled on Jan. 6, 1834; under Act of Congress of June 7, 1832, payment to date from March 4, 1831; normal allowance, \$100; sums received to date of publication of list, \$100. (Rev. Roll in vol. xiv, Sen. doc. 514, 23rd Congress, 1st sess. 1833-34). "He resided in Marshall Co. June 1, 1840 aged 77" (Census of Pensioners, 1841 p. 148.)

CHISENHALL FAMILY.

There is no motto to the Chisenhall display of arms. This is on account of the antiquity of the heraldic grant. The British did not use the motto prior to the Norman Invasion (1066). Its use in Britain (Ireland and Scotland) came with the Norman Conquerors, who were needless to say, extremely unpopular at first. As their popularity waxed so did the use of mottoes among the British. Thus most arms of Anglo-Saxon (and Celtic) families which were granted prior to 1200 - 1250 do not bear mottoes and the majority of grants after that time did.

The mantling of decorative matter around the shield has no especial shape. This is left to the taste and discretion of the artist. The only heraldic rule as to the mantle (also sometimes called a lambrequin) in British arms, was that it must be in the livery colors of the shield; i. e. the two first colors, metals or furs mentioned in the blazon. In some German and Continental arms this rule sometimes varied but where there was a variation, it is always so set forth in the blazon with the specific colors of the mantling, given. The mantle takes its name from a cloak or mantle which the mounted knight wore suspended from his helmet. This was to protect him, encased as he was in metal, from the winter's snows or the summer's hot sun rays which would have fairly frozen or cooked him as the case might be. This mantle would become cut and slashed in combat and the knight was very proud of these rents. He usually had them patched in contrasting colors to make them more noticeable.

THE CHISENHALL FAMILY.

This fine old Lincolnshire family has been recorded in England since before the Norman Conquest (1066). It may be found in its various forms (Chisenhal, Chisenhale, Chesenall, Chysnall, etc.) in Domesday Book, Ragman's Roll and the Roll of the Hundreds, the first three cenci taken by the Normans for tax purposes between the years 1085 and 1150. The name is identical with an ancient village Chissen, in Lancashire, now inactive, also called Chisen. Whether this village took its name from the family whose "Hall" or Castle was nearby or the opposite occurred, is like the "chicken and the egg" question and the fact being buried in the mists of antiquity, nobody knows today. The family came to Lancashire from Lincolnshire before the XIV Century for it is recorded (1332) that John Roger de Chisenhale fought maurading Scots in that year. Another record has (1421) John, son of William Chisenhale, fighting in France, from Lancaster. The family seem to have sided with the Yorkists in the Wars of the Roses as they sent five members to the Yorkist army. They were Cavaliers in the Cromwellian Civil War and their estates were forfeited by Cromwell but later returned by Charles II. There are many memorials to members of the family in the ancient Church at Standish, Lancastershire. These are recorded in the "History of Standish" by T. C. Portens, 1927, J. Stars and Sons, Ltd. London. Among these are an elaborate marble to Edward Chisenall of Chisenall, a large and elaborate carving of the family arms and a carved placque upon the wall in the body of the church, an elaborately sculptured tomb cover of Maud, wife of Robert de Chesenale, showing her recumbent figure. It is of the XIV Century and is the oldest monument in the church.

In America the family is found in early Virginia and in Orange County, North Carolina prior to the Revolutionary War.

Delaney Chisenhall was married three times: first in Orange County, North Carolina, next in Virginia and the third time in Centre, Alabama. (Cherokee County). There was a Delaney Chisenhall, possibly the above, who served in the War of 1812. He was born 1796 - 7 and married Polly Woods.

Samuel Chisenhall was a member of Capt. William's Company of Militia in Orange County in the Revolutionary War. (Colonial Records, N. C. Vol. X).

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN CARD DATA.

SOME EARLY FAMILY HISTORY.

Part II

The Maternal Line.

Sometime between the close of the Revolution, and the year, 1799, four Revolutionary soldiers, with their families, moved from Virginia to East Tennessee. (Later three of them moved to Jackson County, Alabama.) By strange coincidence, the given names of these four men were "William" - William Wilson - William Townsend - William Davis and William Holland. All are ancestors of James Madison Card.

William Holland's son, James, married William Davis' daughter, Myra; and William Wilson's son, Thomas Jefferson (Major Wilson), married William Townsend's daughter, Huldah.

I have no record of any middle name or initial of the four pioneers. All of them are buried in Jackson County, Alabama - except William Townsend, who is buried in Franklin County, Tennessee near Cowan. Davis and Holland are buried in the old family burying ground - known as the Holland Graveyard - in Maynard's Cove, Jackson County - where James Madison Card was born. William Wilson lies in the old Roach Graveyard, near Fackler, Alabama.

William Wilson had a son Isaac (brother to Major Wilson), who fought in the War of 1812 - was at Fort St. Phillip, below New Orleans - and fought nine days and nights.

James Madison Card is the son of Maria Holland, daughter of Newton Holland and Hulda Wilson. Huldah Wilson was the daughter of Major Thomas Wilson and Huldah Townsend. Huldah Townsend is the daughter of William Townsend, Continental soldier - and Major Thomas Wilson is the son of William Wilson - also Continental soldier. Newton Holland, father of Maria Holland and grandfather of James M. Card,

is the son of James Holland and Myra Davis: James Holland is the son of the Revolutionary soldier, William Holland: Myra Davis is the daughter of the Revolutionary soldier, William Davis. Quite a mix up - but clear enough, once you get it in mind.

I have no record of the old pioneer wives and mothers - except that Grandmother Davis and Grandmother Holland are buried by their husbands - in the Holland cemetery - and their graves are walled over with roughly hewn rocks.

James Holland, great-grandfather of James Madison Card, also fought in the War of 1812, under Gen. Andrew Jackson. He was a member of a company of picked Riflemen that engaged in the Battle of New Orleans. The old rifle that he carried through this battle is in possession of William A. Card's family. William A. Card being a younger brother of James Madison Card. This curious old relic is in a splendid state of preservation. It was exhibited in Doster Hall, University of Alabama, along with other interesting relics, when the University celebrated it's Centennial, last May (1932).

It is through this ancestor ~~#####~~, that we have traced our membership to the Daughter's of 1812. He you will note is, "Direct".

There is another priceless heirloom in the family. A. N. Holland, Scottsboro, uncle of James Madison Card, has a Continental One Hundred Dallar bill, issued in 1793 by the State of Virginia to William Wilson for his services in the Revolution. There were originally two of these bills - but I ~~#####~~ believe one of them was "redeemed", - Great - great - great - Grandfather Wilson keeping the other for a memento of that awful struggle. It too, is in a perfect state of preservation. It has been "framed", and resembles nothing so much as an old fashioned marriage certificate.

As stated before, all four of our pioneer families moved from Virginia, together, lived in East Tennessee, in the same settlement; and then emigrated southward.

William Townsend settling in Franklin County, Tennessee; and Davis - Holland and Wilson pushing across the big Mountains into Northeast Alabama; Davis and Holland settling in a cove at the foot of the mountains - and Wilson pushing on some twelve miles further to the banks of the Tennessee River; where he finally settled at Old Bellefonte - near what is now Scottsboro, Alabama. Jackson County, Ala.

It is curious to note the effect, geographically, that the different settlements had upon the politics of our family. In the fertile river bottom land, the Wilson plantations - they became slaveholders - great political leaders and "States Rights" men. Their sons fought in the Confederate Army, and their descendants are almost without exception, Democrats. We will turn our attention now to the Holland and Davis Clan. Resting at the foot of those towering mountains after the long trek from Greeneville, Tennessee, they found the land good. They settled there, improved their acres, but added little to the original Government grant. The Davis line died out - we know little about them - but the Hollands were strong Union men during the Civil War and are Republicans to this day. A. N. Holland, Postmaster at Scottsboro, has held this Federal job - with exception of the Wilson Administration - for over thirty years. Newton Holland, father of Maria Holland, grandfather of James Madison Card, was so active for the union cause that Confederate soldiers burned his home during the War.

(This of course was not the old Holland ancestral home where James Madison Card was born.)
(It is still standing - it was built by James Holland - as I remember)

Note: Since writing the above, the fact has been brought to my attention that these four families lived in Middle Tennessee a short time before coming to Alabama to reside.
(I do not know where - nor how long.)

One of the most colorful figures in the early history of Alabama, is Major Thomas J. Wilson. Born in the last month of the last year of the Eighteenth Century, he lived almost through the entire Nineteenth. As I have told you, he is the son of William Wilson, Revolutionary soldier, who according to Major Wilson's own testimony, served on Washington's staff, and was present when Cornwallis surrendered. Certainly the elder Wilson was a man of means, and unusual intelligence for his day.

Records show that Major Thomas Wilson married Miss Huldah Townsend in Franklin County, Tennessee, September 16th, 1820. We also have records that the Wilsons came to Alabama, along with the Hollands and Davises, in 1820. So, I infer that young Wilson and Huldah Townsend had been sweethearts back in Tennessee, and that she became his bride on the journey to Alabama, coming with him to the wilderness of this new State, where she lived fourteen years, dying in 1834. She was the mother of four girls, one of whom was Huldah our ancestress - the grandmother of James Madison Card. (Major Wilson was married twice again.) This Huldah Townsend appears to have been a woman of much refinement and education. Major Wilson served seventeen years in the State Legislature - ten years in the House and seven in the Senate. (Details of his terms are found in copy of the "interview" attached). He, perhaps, would also have been Governor of the State - but when he was being urged to make the race in 1856 by a host of friends - domestic troubles at home demanded his personal attention - so he retired to private life.

At least, he has the unique distinction of moving the capitol of Alabama. (Alabama has had four capitols - Huntsville, Cahaba, Tuscaloosa, and Montgomery.) Tuscaloosa was the capitol when Major Wilson was elected to the House in 1837, and remained so for ten years. It was inconvenient to a lot of the members tho' - lacked a lot being in the center of the State - so in 1847, the legislature voted as to whether it should remain in Tuscaloosa or be removed to ~~Montgomery~~ Montgomery. The fight was bitter - the balloting ^{close} - in fact when the election

was over, the result was a tie. Major was at that time President of the Senate - (ordinarily the Presidents did not vote on measures except in event of a tie), and cast the deciding vote for Montgomery. The capitol was moved from Tuscaloosa. Another historian relates the incident, as "the balloting was very close - in fact a tie - the members voting alphabetically - and Major Wilson being at the end of the list (the W's) voted for Montgomery and the question was decided by him." But the first version I have given of the procedure is Major Wilson's own account, related over and over again by him to his grandson and grand-daughters - so I believe that is really the way it occurred.

Anyway he helped make a great deal of interesting history. He was in the thick of Indian troubles - heard the impassioned oratory of Chief Apothleoholo before the legislature, and Chief Eufaula's plaintive farewell, when the Indians were on their westward march to new reservations, beyond the Mississippi. Back in 1914 when Maria Holland Card, (James Card's mother - and Major Wilson's grand-daughter) visited Tuscaloosa, I had the pleasure of accompanying her through the old State Capitol building. We stood behind the speakers desk or stand, in the old Senate Chamber - where Major Wilson directed so much constructive legislation - where he made history so to speak. My grandmother was much affected. The building was ~~destroyed~~ destroyed by fire in August 1923.

Note: The following "interview" appeared in the Scottsboro Citizen, a now discontinued Jackson County weekly - sometime during the year 1883. A. N. Holland, Scottsboro, Alabama, has the clipping in the original print. His daughter Lillian typed copies for other members of the family - hence I am unable to give the exact date of the above Publication. (E.C.S.)

Major Thomas Wilson.

Last monday Major Thomas Wilson, who lives in the vicinity of old Bellefonte, was in Scottsboro and at our solicitation, kindly agreed to be interviewed for the Citizen. The subject of our sketch is a son of Mr. William Wilson, who was born in Virginia in the year 1767. William Wilson went into the Revolutionary War under General Washington, and was with him at the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, October 19th - 1781. He moved from Virginia to East Tennessee, and his son Tom was born eight miles from Greenville on the 11th of December, 1799. The Wilson family moved from ~~East Tennessee~~ East Tennessee to Middle Tennessee and from there

to Jackson County, Alabama in 1820. William Wilson died in 1840. Thomas Wilson was married in Franklin County, Tennessee, to a Miss Townsend, September 16th - 1820. By this union they had four daughters; only two of whom are now living. This wife died in September, 1834. He married his second wife, Miss Lackey, of Jackson County, in 1838. By her he had ten children - four sons and six daughters. She died in March 1854. Two sons and three daughters by this ~~#####~~ marriage are living. Major Wilson was married to his third wife, Miss Rogers, in October 1857. She is still living. No children were born by this union.

Major was elected a Justice of the Peace in a precinct in Maynard's Cove in the Spring of 1836, which office he held until the summer ~~#####~~ of 1837, resigning then on being elected to the lower branch of the legislature. There were eight or ten candidates that year for legislative honors, the county at that time being entitled to six Representatives. The election took place on the first Monday in August, and something over two thousand votes were polled in that election. Hon. Robert Scott was elected to the legislature with Major Wilson, also William King Charles Cross, [?] McDavid and [?] Harris. The last two gentlemen resigned soon after their election to enlist in the Florida War, and a special election was held, resulting in the choice of Alvy Finley and David Lucas. The subject of our sketch is the only one of the above gentlemen now living. The Legislature convened at Tuscaloosa, the then Capitol of the State. The State government was moved to Montgomery in 1847. Major ^{Wilson} made a good member and was re-elected in 1838 and again in 1839 - the legislature met annually at that time. In 1840 he was elected to the State senate, and was re-elected in 1843. He was a candidate again for Senatorial honors in 1847, but was defeated by the late General Joseph Frazier. But the Major was not allowed to remain in quietude and was induced to run for the legislature in 1849, and was triumphantly elected to the house; and was again re-elected in 1851. He was elected to the Senate for the Second time in 1854; he served until 1856, when a new apportionment was made, and a law passed making all Senators (Here the print seems to have faded making the reading matter unintelligible)

He refused to make another canvass for the office. The late General William Austin, of Stevenson was elected to the Senate in 1857 as the Major's successor. So this ended the long public career of one of Jackson County's distinguished men. He served his people faithfully in the legislature, and made a record of which his posterity may feel proud. 37

His public career was endorsed by his constituents, and he was beaten only once in all his political campaigns. He had a public tact for electioneering, and was considered invincible as a candidate. Major Wilson was the Adjutant of a battalion of a United States militia organized in Jackson County in 1838 for the purpose of quelling the Cherokee Indians, who were then on their reservation in some of the counties South of the Tennessee River. The Indians were quelled before any fighting was necessary, (Here the ink is again smeared) War Between the States though his sympathies were with the South - two of his sons were in the Confederate Army.

Our venerable friend is a true Democrat, and has voted for every Democratic candidate for President, since General Andrew Jackson's first race in 1824. He has never failed in his zeal in behalf of Democracy, and has attended most every County convention of his party since the War. He has not sought any political preferment, since his election to the Senate in 1855.

Major Wilson has forty grand-children, and about fifteen great-grand children, and if he lives until the 11th of next December will be Eighty-Four (84) years old. (So the date of this paper must be the year 1883, Issue of the Citizen. Note by Annie C. Proctor).

He joined the Primitive Baptist Church in 1827, and has been a faithful member ever since. His general health is good, and he walks with more sprightliness than a man of forty-five. His memory is remarkable. During our interview, he answered every question promptly, and without having any written reference. The Major - having moved to Jackson County when it was a wilderness, can "many a tale unfold" about it's early history when the dusky savage, wild beasts held sway and remarkable incidents that occurred in the "olden days and golden". May he live to see another Democrat elected President, and finally celebrate his centenary. An incident occurred in 1880 which would not be out of place to incorporate in this hastily written sketch. During our friends long sojourn in Montgomery, he made many warm personal friends, among them being Hon. Thomas H. Watts, afterward

Governor of the State. In Maynard's Cove in 1880, a public speaking and basket dinner was given, and Governor Cobb and Ex-Governor Watts were the speakers for the occasion. The Major, of course was present, and when he and Governor Watts met they actually embraced, and the scene was very affecting. It was the first time they had met since the halcyon days of '55; and they recalled many a happy reminiscence of the past. (The End)

You will note that this "interview" gives the date of William Wilson's birth 1767. This is undoubtedly a typographical error - as he would have been only fourteen years old at the close of the Revolutionary War (1781) and it seems improbable if he would have been in the service at all certainly not on General Washington's staff - as I have reason to believe that he was. It is likely that the correct date of William Wilson's birth is either 1757 or 1751. I believe if the Wilson line were traced, many interesting facts would be uncovered. Major Wilson had a descendant Robt. L. Wilson, living at Stevenson, Alabama, who bore a striking resemblance to President Woodrow Wilson, whose family were originally from the South.

A Wilson was one of the signers of The Declaration of Independence. He was born in St. Andrews, Scotland, in 1742 and died in 1798. He was a lawyer and lived in Pennsylvania. Many characteristics of the Wilson family - that is, the Wilsons related to us - lead me to believe we are Scotch too.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF JAMES MADISON CARD.

The house, where James Madison Card was born, was built one hundred years ago, (1832), by his Great-grandfather, James Holland - veteran of the War of 1812. Seven generations of Holland-Card family have lived in it; four were born there, and seven lie buried in the old Holland graveyard. The land had been in the family since the pioneers settled it first in 1812 until after the death of Maria Holland Card, in 1919 - when it was sold in 1920 for division among the heirs. It is only a comfortable looking old farm house now - but it was a very imposing residence in it's day - the finest, in fact, in all that country. The lumber that went into its making was whip-sawn, on Sand Mountain, across the Tennessee River, and was hauled five miles by ox-team: Originally there were two very large rooms, two smaller rooms, a front and porch, and a closed in hall. The house fronts west on an old public road used by Andrew Jackson on his journey to New Orleans. The larger room on the South was the parlor - that on the North was used as the parents' bedroom - the smaller rooms, called the "side-rooms" were for the children - one for the boys (South), the other for the girls (North). The kitchen, built of cedar log was several feet back of the big house, quite separate and apart. There were no screens then - something had to be done to keep flies, heat and food odors, out of the main building. The house was remodelled about thirty years ago, but the same walls and same floors of the main house are still there. The framing of the house is of Chestnut - the rafters of Cedar, morticed and fastened together with White Oak pins. The nails were hand forged. The flooring is of White Pine boards averaging 6" in width. The walls are panelled with wainscoting. Two immense chimneys of limestone rock flank the North and South: In the parlor room, the mantle is of solid Cherry - hand carved in "saw-teeth" design. The huge fireplaces are arched to a keystone - a new hearth has

been laid in the North room - but the original hearth is still in the parlor. The house was painted white, with red trimmings. And - the pioneer cabin built by William Holland still stands on the place. It is built of Cedar logs, and is in perfect condition. A quaint two room structure, with a limestone chimney in the center. One of my own generation was born there - Lucille Campbell. The old stables are still standing - in fact there has never been but the one barn - built of cedar logs - in constant use for one hundred and twelve years. There is a fine spring in the side of the mountain - just across the old road from the big house. Below that spring is a round trough of limestone rock, chiseled out by James Card's father. The lead troughs that carry the water from the spring to this stone basin - are of small cedar logs, split and hollowed out for this purpose, by William Holland and his sons. They used this means to pipe the water to the foot of the mountain, thereby saving their women-folks a long climb to the spring. A few yards northeast of the house, is the old Holland burying ground - its nearness to the dwelling of the living - a grim reminder of how closely the pioneers had to watch the graves of their dead, lest wild animals or the savages molest them. For the Indians continued to harrass the State twenty years after that place was homesteaded. I do not know how many people lie buried there - twenty five or thirty, perhaps - all related to me, except one.

I believe my grandmother Maria Holland Card, before her death had this bit of ground " entailed - that it belongs to the family forever and ever. I wish some of us would have a plat made of this cemetery - showing position of the graves, names and other data. Also, the graves of the soldiers should have some sort of marker. There are two Revolutionary soldiers buried there, one at least if not more, veteran of the War of 1812, and a veteran of the Civil War. There is one other interesting landmark in that neighborhood - the old Holland's Chapel, (Northern Methodist) is correct (E.C.S. says in her copy that it was - Presbyterian - I believe)- and quite a handsome building in it's day, where members of our family worshipped for generations. I, myself, have heard many sermons preached from ~~the~~ it's pulpit.

PARENTS OF JAMES MADISON CARD.

Sometimes in the 'Fifties, John Thomson Neil Card, elder brother of Benjamin Franklin Card, bought a farm on "Mud Creek" (Wilbuth Fine House) near Maynard's Cove, Jackson County, Alabama. John, as I have already told you, was a veteran of the Mexican War. During the Civil War, young Benjamin, on a furlough, came to visit his brother John, and there he met Maria Holland. A courtship followed, and they were married a few months afterward. I believe their eldest child was born in '65 (Margaret), and James Madison in '67. A few years after their marriage they bought the old Holland homestead, and it remained in possession of their heirs until 1920. The father of James Madison Card was well loved in his community - a man who counted his friends by his acquaintances. I have heard him say many a time - always with pride - that he never had occasion to resort to the courts to settle any dispute with his neighbors - never had a lawsuit in his life. He was very scrupulous about his obligations - did not owe a penny at his death. Besides farming, Benjamin could do carpentry work, and did much work of this kind in Jackson County. He was an old-time "joiner" - and made nearly all the coffins used in that vicinity, for a period of thirty or thirty-five years. He was a quiet, unassuming, man - gentle in his family. James Madison inherited much of the sweetness of his disposition from his father. I believe that I have already stated that Benjamin Card was a Confederate soldier, private in the 44th Tennessee Infantry, commanded by Col. Fulton - and took part in the Battle of Shiloh. His brother, Milton Harvey Card, was a second Lieutenant in the same regiment. "Grandpa Ben" was quite fond of fish - and fishing. During the season, he always had several traps in the Tennessee River - some twelve miles from home. On a trip to examine these nets - his horse, a spirited colt, became frightened and ran away, throwing the old man out of his buggy, against a tree, fracturing his skull. He died a few days later without regaining consciousness. This was in October 1904. Someone has said "Back of every honored son - a mother". James Madison Card had a most wonderful mother. A woman of great strength of character and nobility of spirit. She loved the finer things of life - music - poetry, good books - especially poetry. One of the tender memories of my childhood is my grandmother's old "Scrap Book". This was filled with all sorts of clippings - recipes, materials - most of it poetry though. A book she was always happy to read from to us - but we were never to touch it ourselves. She was well educated. When a young girl she had stayed with

some of her Wilson kin at Old Bellefonte and attended school there several years. This school offered unusual advantages for it's day. Federal soldiers burned the town during the Civil War. Nothing is left now - except the foundationstones of the old tavern and the school building - and the ancient cemetery. Benjamin and Maria Card had a home - but their's was the poverty of the Southerners during Reconstruction. It was a time of privation and hardships. After the close of that frightful war, life was almost as primitive as the pioneer days - worse, perhaps, for the old settlers found plenty of game for food in the wilderness. Now, both armies had laid waste the country. No stock was left, and in many cases even the seed crops were destroyed. Maria Holland - like the women of her generation - rose nobly to the occasion. She raised sheep, carded wool, spun and wove the cloth, and made by hand all the garments that clothed her family. She knitted socks and made tallow candles. She raised vegetables for the table - besides, drying, preserving surplus fruits and berries for winter. She even compounded and prepared the simple, home-made remedies that were found in the "medicine cabinets" of the Seventies. And clung to them with much faith in their curative powers, as long as she lived. There was beef gall and turpentine - a disinfectant; there was mutton tallow for chapped little hands; there were flannel cloths for groupy chests, and there were herbs for teas, and all sorts of red pepper plasters and corn meal poultices, and sprin tonics of sulphur and molasses - such a long, long list of them. She had always a bountiful supply - enough to divide with a neighbor at any time. Besides this, she made the quilts and blankets and cooked and washed and cleaned for ten children - seven of whom lived to be grown. In spite of child bearing, and hard work, she did not neglect her children's ideals. There was inborn in them all a taste for good books and poetry and music. She taught them to cultivate people of influence and position; she warned them against low company - they were always to remember who they were - that there were good folks behind them - and that they were never to feel abashed in anybody's company. She was ambitious for them too - she managed to send them all away to school or college the best the State afforded at that time. And when they came home on vacations from the larger and more sophisticated centers, perhaps in the critical eye of youth, the old place looked smaller somehow - the marble-topped furniture shabby and old fashioned - but I venture to say Mother was the same mother. At any rate, she looms bigger, ^{and} ~~is~~ in my eye as the years go by.

Some Odd Bits of Personal Information.

When James Madison Card was amere stripling, his father had a fine tract of cedar timber on his place - which he gave to Jim and a younger brother, they worked this tract - that is they cut the timber and hauled the logs to town and sold them. The money received was their own. This was the beginning of Jims career as a lumberman. He invested his money tho' in a year at school at Scottsboro. I believe Scottsboro had a military Institute at that time - at any rate - there was a sort of business course connected with the school. Jim was in school there three or four years - and help defray his own expenses. Summers he would take a horse and buggy and travel all over the county - canvassing for the school. That is he was instrumental in getting a number of new pupils to enroll in the school, and he received so much credit for every new pupil he sent in. Jim - one old friend was told me - was such a courteous, well-mannered altogether lovable chap, that he made friends everywhere, and a great success of anything that he undertook. He graduated from this school with high standing, and after he had established himself in business, he helped his younger brothers and sisters get an education too. Unselfishness was one of his finest traits. Like all the Hollands, he loved the old homestead. He had the house remodelled, new rooms were added to it's main building, and the whole painted. Much of it's quaint charm was lost in the transformation, perhaps, but it gained as much in convenience. He was a thoughtful son - always buying improved farm implements; new furniture and other comforts. He gave his mother one of the first talking machines on the market; he helped install a rural telephone system in that neighborhood - there was nothing he overlooked. He had a passion for music. When he was ten or twelve years old, his father allowed him to have a cotton patch. He planted, hoed, plowed and picked the cotton himself and spent the money he made for an accordion. You can imagine him spending happy hours with this instrument hugged close to his childish breast, playing the old fashioned tunes his mother sang. Years later he was to enjoy with as deep an appreciation - the finest artists in the world. He had his mother, was purposeful, courageous, ambitious - undaunted by the most trying conditions. Ever when a very little boy he was not easily intimidated - ("The child is father to the man") - he was master of any situation. His mother declared that she could not even punish him because he refused to accept the punishment as being such. There was a horse on the farm called "Old Jobe". Little Jim admired himextravagantly. Whenever he was naughty and his mother tied him to the bedpost - Jim made believe to himself, he was only old Jobe at the hitching block; if she put him in the closet, he was old Jobe shut in the stable; if she grew desperate enough to give him a switching - only old Jobe get a thrashing - and he was soon smiling at her through childish tears. She found out early in his life that she could not coerce him into good behavior - she must Inspire him. And that is the way she managed Jim. The way in fact she handled " " "

JAMES MATTHEWS FAMILY of Jackson County, Alabama,

James Matthews Family claim descent from Alexander Matthews, whose will was proved in Shenendoah Valley, Va., 1783, naming wife Grizzell and sons, James, John, Alexander, Jr., Benjamin and George, is not proved. However it is thought that James and John came to what is now Jackson County, Alabama. It is known that one John Matthews signed the petition of settlers on Cherokee Lands North of Tennessee River in August 1819. It is also known that an ancestor of this family is one James Matthews buried at the Cumberland Presbyterian Burying Ground on Little Crow Creek, Jackson County.

Concerning the James Matthews, who is buried in the Limestone boxed up grave, in the Cumberland Presbyterian Graveyard on Little Crow Creek.

There are three in a row boxed-up graves just to east and at foot of Jeremiah Matthews. Jeremiah was born, Oct. 15, 1800; died May 10, 1845. The middle boxed-up grave has inscription in large limestone rock and it is worn almost beyond reading. It appears to read; "Sacred to the Memory of Elizabeth, wife of James Matthews. She was born A. D. 1771 and departed this life, Dec. 8, 1834, age 63 years". This inscription is hand cut and very dim; there could be an error in reading the last one in 1771 and 3 in 1834 and 6 in 63, but it is thought to be correct as given. The 1840 census shows that James Matthews was living on lower part of Little Crow Creek and was between 70 & 80 years of age. So he was born 1760-1770. This census shows only one white male (20-30) living in James Matthews household. Some think that James Matthews married Elizabeth Harden, but it is believed that her name was Elizabeth Hardway for the following reasons. A son, Arthur H. Matthews, is listed in some places on an account book of Carpenter's for 1847-48 as Hardy, and there is a Hardway Matthews buried in Little Coon Creek Cove, born Oct. 14, 1834; died Dec. 1, 1853, who seems to be a grandson of James and Elizabeth Matthews. He appears to be a son of James B. Matthews, who was born Dec. 26, 1795 and died Oct. 16, 1853 and wife Elizabeth Gonce Matthews, who was born May 10, 1798 and died Sept. 18, 1883.

My dear grand-mother died in 1831, two weeks after her child was born, which child was a girl and named Druzie, for whom I named my daughter, Druzie(Drucilla). There were twelve children born to them and the first born was William, born in 1806. When his father was eighteen years old, my great-grand-father, Nias Allen, father of my grand-mother, Bettie, was a soldier in the War of the Revolution of 1776. The Allens were very fine people and were well to-do, in fact, were wealthy in negroes and lands. My dear precious mother was a member of the McCrary family. Your father, Sam Rogers, is the best type of my grand-father, Sam McCrary, however, grand-father had as fine a head and face as I ever saw on any man; but your father is the best likeness of anyone of his descendants. Service: The veteran alleged that he enlisted in March or April 1776; served as Orderly Sergeant in Captains John Caldwell's and Felix Warley's Companies, Colonel William Thompson's 3rd South Carolina Regiment and was discharged the last of 1777; he then enlisted and served as Orderly Sergeant in Captains Benjamin(#####)Tutt's and Moore's Companies, Colonel Williamson's South Carolina Regiment and in Colonel Farr's South Carolina Regiment; was in the Seige of ~~Savannah~~ Savannah; length of his entire service, 5 years.

Pension: John McCutchen was allowed pension on Certificate No. 25 771 which was issued January 2, 1834, rate \$80 per annum, act of June 7, 1832, Alabama Agency.

Family: He married on January 2, 1823 in Morgan County, Alabama, Cassandra Gray of Morgan County. She was living in Jackson County, Alabama in June 1842, her age not shown. She was dead on July 14, 1842, date of death not given. It was stated that veteran left many children names not designated, by a former marriage and that Cassandra died leaving none. There is no further information concerning veteran's former marriage. Joseph McCutchen was administrator of the veteran's estate, no relationship shown. He was living in Bellefonte, Alabama in 1842. One William McCutchen was of Jackson County, Alabama in 1842, no relationship given.

Residences: In 1776 he resided near Ninety-Six, South Carolina. He lived in East Tennessee. He resided in Alabama in Morgan County, Madison County, and Jackson County.

Death: January 17, 1835 in Jackson County, Alabama.

LAST PAYMENT OF PENSION: From records of The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Washington, D. C.

On October 7, 1854 and November 25, 1854, various depositions were presented to the Probate Court of Jackson County, Alabama, to the effect that John McCutchen(or McCutchin), a pensioner of the Revolutionary War at the rate of eighty dollars per annum, certificate No. 25771, Alabama Agency, died in Jackson County on or about January 15, 1833, leaving a widow, Cassandra, his second wife, by whom he had no issue,. The following were named as heirs through his first marriage: John L. McCutchin, Walker McCutchin (Deceased), Celia McCutchin Riddle, Joshua McCutchin, Anna McCutchin(married name illegible and Joseph McCutchin(deceased) father of the then present administrator, Mackli M. McCutchin). Arrears of pension, covering the period from March 4, 1831 to January 15, 1835, were certified for payment to the administrator by the Treasury Department, Second Comptroller's Office, on January 3, 1855.

John McCutchen received a pension for services in N. C. Militia as private. Born in South Carolina, died in Jackson County, Alabama.

(His first wife was a daughter of William Walker and she and her child are buried in a double walled up grave in the Robertson cemetery in Long Hollow).

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF JOHN McCUTCHEM.

In the name of God Amen, I, John McCutchen of the County of Jackson and State of Alabama being weak in body but sound mind and memory, Thanks be to God, call unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and order this my last will and testament. That is to say, principally, first of all, I give and recommend my soul unto the hand of Almighty God that give it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors. Nothing doubting by at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Almighty power of God; and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in life, I give and demise (devise) and dispose of the same in the following manner and form: That is to say, I make, constitute, order and appoint Cassandra McCutchen and William Walker McCutchen my sole executrix and executor of this my last will and testament and do ordain that all the estate of which I may die possessed of and have not otherwise devised shall be sold and the proceeds divided equally between my legal heirs and their representatives except my said grandson, William Walker McCutchen and Cassandra McCutchen and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other former testaments, wills, legacies, bequests and executors by me in any wise before named will and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and thirty four.

States Cassandra married John McCutchen in 1822, she then being about 36 years of age and he 68. No issue living.

Deposition of Walker McCutchen states that his grandfather married in 1822 or 1823 in Morgan County, Alabama. That he, Walker McCutchen was left an orphan child and was reared by his grandfather, John McCutchen. John H. Gray, now of Arkansas, states that Cassandra died in 1842. Heirs unknown.

OBITUARY OF JOHN McCUTCHEM.

From Southern Advocate, Huntsville, Alabama, January 27, 1835.

"It is our unhappy lot to announce that another Hero is gone ! Col. John McCutchen, who in times that tried men's souls stood boldly forth in defense of the liberty and independence of his country, bidding defiance not only to oppression, but confronting the armed myrmidons of the Tyrant, was on the 17th(inst) in the 80th year of his age, summoned to another and better world !

"He engaged early in the Revolutionary conflict, was at the defense of Fort Moultrie, the battle at Eutaw Springs, and with a true, patriotic zeal, participated in all the perils and distress that so peculiarly characterized the unfeeling warfare, then waged throughout the Carolinas; nor did he retire until he had satisfaction of beholding the independence of his country, for which he had so long and ardently struggled, permanently secured.

"Having devoted his youth to the service of his country in the field, in the maturity of manhood, he engaged with those fearless enterprising pioneers, who emigrating to the West, embarked in the arduous undertaking of reclaiming the fertile valley of the Tennessee from its then savage wilderness, and preparing it for the enjoyment of all the arts, luxuries and refinements of social life.

"He has ever been noted as a man of uncommon intellectual endowments - for the last forty years has been a christianity of the Baptist order, and been esteemed by all as a worthy example and an honor to his profession. Thus ripe in years and rich in consciousness of having at two different periods of his life, rendered important services to his country and in consoling hopes of a glorious immortality, the veteran has departed leaving his relatives and numerous friends to mourn his loss.

"On Monday the 19th inst. as the citizens of this vicinity had convened to pay the last honors to the deceased, on motion of Maj. John B. Stevens, they constituted themselves into a meeting for the purpose of making a public manifestation of their grief, to acknowledge the services and express the high regard they have ever entertained for the principles of their departed friend. Col. James Smith was called to the chair and Maj. John B. Stevens appointed Secretary. When the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, viz: ' Resolved, That under a deep sense of gratitude we owe to those sages and heroes who achieved our independence, we deem it a duty incumbent upon us, their sons, with a filial piety to pay every tribute of respect to their virtues and their valor, as the only remuneration in our power, for the manifold rights and privileges that we now enjoy.

' RESOLVED, That in the death of Col. John McCutchen, we have to lament the loss of one of that band of aged warriors, whose presence never fails to enliven our zeal in the cause of liberty and to remind us of what it cost - that in him we have lost a firm patriot, a worthy citizen, a pious Christian and an esteemed friend. And while we respectfully acknowledge his public service, stern integrity and private worth, we deeply sympathize with his widow and other members of his family in their bereavement.

' RESOLVED, that the above resolutions be signed by the Committee and Secretary and transmitted to the Democrat and the Southern Advocate for publication."

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES.

Information from the papers in the Revolutionary War Pension Claims, Office of the Commissioner, Department of the Interior, Bureau of Pensions, Washington, D. C., Sur File # 32406, John McCutchen was allowed pension on his application executed in Jackson County, Alabama, Feb. 22, 1833, at which time he was seventy-seven years of age. He stated that he resided and enlisted near Ninety Six, North Carolina, in March or April 1776, as Orderly Sergeant in Captain John Caldwell's Company, Colonel William Thompson's 3rd Regiment under General Moultrie, marched to Charleston, where he was taken ill and was carried to Camden, and then "up country", where he recovered enough to join Captain Felix Warley's Company, and was discharged the latter part of 1777; he then went to Seneca River and enlisted as Orderly Sergeant in Captain Benjamin Tutt's Company, Colonel Williamson's Regiment and was in the siege of Savannah, after which he was attached to Captain Moors Company; he was captured at Fort Seneca and was a prisoner at Ninety Six, at Camden, at Waxhaws, had small pox at Charlotte and was deserted by his captors during the battle of Kings Mountain; he made his way to Fish D Ford the day General Sumter was defeated and finally joined Colonel Farr a scout against the Indians at the time of the siege of Ninety-Six, served years in all. After the war he resided in South Carolina upwards of twenty years, some years in East Tennessee, and about twenty-three in Alabama. He married in Morgan County, Alabama January the 22nd, 1823 to Cassandra Gray. He died January 17th, 1835, and she resided in Jackson County, Alabama, in 1842.

As John McCutchen of Tenn., and John Mc of Ala., are very close to same age which one belongs to whom of the above 5 brothers ? They were the first McCutchen emigrants to the South and ancestors of both Johns & Samuel.

EARLY MARRIAGES.

Prior to the Revolution, a marriage could be solemnized only by a Minister of the Gospel of the Established Church. For this purpose a license might be procured. This was a pre-requisite of the Governor (a gratuity), but was ordinarily issued from the office of th County Clerk who accounted with the Governor in his settlement with the Secretary each year. No record was kept by the Clerk of the licence issued by him, except for the purpose of settlement. From 1748 to 1774, Marriage Records have been compiled from entries made by the Clerk on the fly-leaves at the end of the books and on blanks and borders, and strangely only thm names of the men were entered.

REVOULATIONARY DECLARATION

Sworn and proven statements of service were required to be made by applicants for pensions under the laws of the United States.

From records of Augusta and Frederick Counties in Virginia:

JOHN' McCUTCHIN'S DECLARATION:

"Of the Little Calf Pasture in Augusta Co., and aged 82 years on the 13th of August, 1832., John McCutchen entered the service in the early part of 1777, or 1778. (He thinks it was 1777, when he was drafted for three months against the Indians. He marched to Clover Lick where he remained until the latter part of the next November when he was discharged with the rest of the troops."

Note: Period of enlistment or draft was customarily for three months. John McCutchen was born on the 13th of August 1750.

WILLIAM McCUTCHEN'S DECLARATION was made June 1833. In this he mentions Col. Sampson Mathews; and Samuel McCutchen, Captain.

Service: According to veteran's statement when he applied for pension January 4, 1833, he served with the Virginia Troops as follows: In 1777, 6 months in Captain William Dicks' Company, Colonel Peter Perkins' Regiment and was in the Battle with the Shawnee Indians at Cumberland Gap on Yellow Creek: in 1780, he served 3 months under Captain Lyfus Shelton.

Pension: Pension Certificate No. 25778 was issued to William McGehe, January 3, 1834, rate \$30 per annum, act of June 7, 1832, Alabama Agency.

Family: The arrears of veteran's pension due at the time of his death were paid to his widow but her name was not mentioned.

Residences: Veteran was born in New Kent County, Virginia. He was living in Pittsylvania County, Virginia when he enlisted in 1777. He was living in Henry County, Virginia when he enlisted in 1780. He moved from Virginia to Sullivan County, then in North Carolina, but later in the eastern part of Tennessee. After living there about 23 years he moved to Lincoln County, Tennessee and about 19 years later he moved from there to Jackson County, Ala., where he was living when he applied for pension in 1833.

Death: May 1, 1836, place not mentioned.

LAST PAYMENT OF PENSION. From records of The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Washington, D. C.

The records show that on October 11, 1841, the clerk of the Jackson County Court of Alabama certified that satisfactory evidence had been presented to the Court that William McGehe (certificate No. 25778), Alabama Agency, died in Jackson County in May 1836 leaving a widow, Divena. Arrears of pension were paid to the widow pursuant to a certificate issued by the Treasury Department Third Auditor's Office, on October 26, 1841.

WILLIAM MCGEHEE, soldier of the American Revolution, aged 79, a resident of Jackson County; private in Virginia State Troops; enrolled on January 4, 1834 under Act of Congress of June 7, 1832, payment to date of publication of list \$75; Rev. Pen. Roll in Vol. xiv, Sen. doc. 514, 23rd Congress, 1st sess, 1833-34.

Parents: Names not mentioned.

Birth: In September 1752.

SERVICES: According to statements made when veteran applied for pension September 7, 1832, he served with North Carolina Troops as follows: In the winter of 1775-76, 2 or 3 months as 1st Sergeant in Captain James Houston's Company, Colonel Polk's Regiment; next served 3 months in Captain William Haggin's Company; from late in 1780 or early in 1781, 3 months in Captain James or William Huggins' Company, Colonel Locke's Regiment.

Pension: Pension Certificate No. 7 548 was issued to John McCrary, April 26, 1833, rate \$30 per annum. act of June 7, 1832 transferred to Huntsville, Alabama Agency from (West) Tennessee Agency.

Family: None mentioned with the exception of veteran's daughter notes below opposite "Residences".

Residences: Veteran lived in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina when he enlisted in the winter of 1775-76. He lived in Rowan County, North Carolina, when he enlisted in 1780 or 1781. When he applied for pension in 1832, he was living in Franklin County, Tennessee. In 1839, he was living in Jackson County, Alabama, and it was stated that he had recently moved there from "West Tennessee" in order to live with his daughter. The name of his daughter was not mentioned.

Death: Date and place not mentioned.

LAST PAYMENT OF PENSION. From records of The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Washington, D. C.

John McCrary, was granted a pension for Revolutionary services under Certificate No. 7548, Alabama Agency. The reports show that the last payment of pension, covering the period from September 4, 1840 to March 4, 1841 was made at Huntsville, Alabama on April 22, 1841 to B. B. Coffey as attorney for the pensioner. On April 1, 1840, the pensioner certified that he had resided in Jackson County, Alabama, for the space of three and one-half years past, and that previous thereto he resided in Franklin County, Tennessee.

Parents: His father was Joseph McCormick of Rutherford County, state not designated. The name of his mother is not shown.

Services: He alleged that while living with his father he volunteered early in the war; he served on different expeditions with the Georgia Troops under Captains James Rowan, Richard Hard, James Stallion, Colonels Benjamin Few and James Jackson; was in a skirmish at Burke Court House; in an engagement at "Hogsskin's Mill" in South Carolina; was in both sieges of Augusta, in which he received three wounds; served as private. His alleged service amounted to 2 years.

Pension: Joseph McCormick was pensioned on Certificate No. 19 538 issued September 18, 1833; rate \$90 per annum; act of June 7, 1832; East Tennessee Agency; transferred to Decatur Alabama Agency.

Family: The name of Joseph McCormick's wife was not given. They had one son, Benjamin McCormick, living in 1828 in McMinn County, Tennessee, with a wife and two infant children, their names not stated. Another son of the veteran by the name of Joseph N. McCormick was living in 1836 in Jackson County, Ala.

Residences: During service, the veteran resided in Rutherford County, state not designated. In 1825, he was living in McMinn County, Tennessee. In 1832, he had moved to Marion County, Tennessee with post office at Jasper. In 1835 he was a resident of Jackson County, Alabama, with post office at "Dodsonville". He was still living there in 1836.

Death: The date of the veteran's death was not given.

LAST PAYMENT OF PENSION. From records of The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Washington, D. C.

In the case of Joseph McCormick, a pensioner of the Revolutionary War, certificate No 19538, Alabama Agency, the records shows that the last payment of pension, covering the period from March 4, 1840 to September 4, 1840, was made on September 28, 1840 at the Pension Agency in Huntsville, Alabama to Joseph Barclay, as attorney for the pensioner. On September 25, 1840 the pensioner certified that he had resided in Jackson County, Alabama for a period of seven years and previous thereto he resided in Marion County, Tennessee.

Joseph R. McCormick, Aged 96, a resident of Jackson County, on June 1, 1840. (Census of Pensioners, 1841 page 148).

Parents: Names are not shown

Birth: In 1764 in Spotsylvania County, Virginia.

Service: According to veteran's statement of October 1832 and October 1833, when he applied for pension, he rendered the following service: he enlisted in 1778 or 1779, served on different tours until after the Seige of Yorktown, in all at least at least 16 months, as Private under Captains Anthony New and others, Colonels Matthews, Armstead and Taylor in the Virginia Troops; he served a tour as substitute for his brother, Berry Matthews, under Lieutenant Robert Dandridge.

Pension: Pension Certificate No. 25769 was issued January 2, 1834 to Benjamin Matthews, rate \$46.66 per annum, act of June 7, 1832, Alabama Agency

Family: The date of his marriage and maiden name of his wife are not shown. His widow, Mary Mathews, resided in Alabama in October, 1844.

Residences: He moved from Spotsylvania County, Virginia, to Caroline County, Virginia, where he resided when he entered service, resided later in the war in Hanover County, Virginia, at the age of 23 years, he moved from Virginia to North Carolina, moved thence when 30 years of age to Kentucky and resided there and in Tennessee until 1818, when he moved to Alabama. He resided in Jackson County, Alabama, when he received his pension in 1834.

Death: He died September 2, 1840, survived by his widow, Mary Mathews.

LAST PAYMENT OF PENSION. From records of The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Washington, D. C.

In the case of Benjamin Mathews, a pensioner of the Revolutionary War, Certificate No. 25769 of the Alabama Agency, was issued on January 2, 1834, to Benjamin Mathews. The records show that on December 10, 1841, the Judge of the County Court of Jackson County, Alabama certified that satisfactory evidence had been presented to that court that the pensioner died on September 2, 1840 and left surviving a widow, Mary Mathews. Benjamin Matthews, a soldier of the American Revolution, aged 70, a resident of Jackson County; private in Virginia Continental Line and Militia; enrolled on January 2, 1834 under Act of Congress of June 7, 1832 payment to date from March 4, 1831; annual allowance, \$46.66; sums received to date of publication of list, \$39.98.

He resided in Jackson County June 1, 1840 aged 78.

Stated she very busy at P.O. this time of year and to write to Miss Pearl Barclay, Route 2, Scottsboro, Alabama, who is a daughter of Jim Barclay. Dave Barclay. Also said Mrs. W.J. Kennamer might answer, on what she has, whose address was just Woodville Ala, box 52.

Mrs. Proctor, I do not know if Miss Pearl Barclay has a phone, but thought before you took the trouble to go to the hall of records at court house, this lady may or may not have some of the records needed to proof my line. If you do get to court house, would of course especially like a copy of the Wills of Joseph and wife, and anything at all to determine how he acquired the land he had. If there is an abstract office in town, it is often very easy, and easier to get it from them rather than the court house, as they have the plats to go by, with all names.

Could I also have a copy of the names on the stones (if you have them) of the old Aspel cemetery. Would you please ask miss Barclay if she knows anyone living in Aspel, or close by who would go to cemetery and copy names? Or if she knows someone that has them? Perhaps Mrs Kennamer, already has them in her records. I perhaps will hear from her in the near future, as am sending her a letter today.

Please do not make so much effort at one time that it will be hard on me to pay you all at once, but certainly willing to pay a reasonable sum, at least some of it at a time. My Dear Mrs. Proctor:

Just received your very informative letter on the Barclay family, and greatly appreciate the effort you made in getting the information, and writing it down for me. At this moment, I am terribly short of funds, plus unable to get a postal order in the mail as I have a cold, and a mean back. As soon as I can, will send a little gift for your consideration.

I received a great part of the information you mailed but I did not have a copy of the names as from the Bible record you sent. It appears this is my family, as Henry B. Barclay birthdate is same as my ancestor Henry B. Barclay. Also I got it straightened out on the Barclay who married Mary Naples.

Now the only thing that is lacking, is where the BRAZELTON name came into the family. I seem to think Joseph Barclay, father of Henry B., possibly married twice, or his mother was a Brazelton, or Mary Ledbetter,-----her maternal or paternal line was Prazelton. No Brazelton records seem available connected to a Barclay----But the Ledbetter and Brazelton families are listed together as neighbors in the Mississippi records,-----which territory, is now Aspel Georgia. The territory was formerly Mississippi, so records show. Then the Ledbetters and Barclays both came from N.C.----but just where, I did not learn.

Mary Ledbetter, was the daughter of JOEL LEDBETTER. Possibly reason first son listed, Joel B. Barclay, named after Ledbetter father. Possibly if George B.,-----the initial B.,-----if we could learn what name the B., was for, it could give another clue, on the Barclay line. Or the B., in William F., name.

I received about every deed and record out of Madison county records, on both Barclay, Prazelton, and Ledbetter, but have no more than what is included in your letter, as far as actual tracing is concerned on the lines.

I did not have the date of marriage, nor the death or birth date of of Mary Ledbetter Barclay. As soon as I am able, I will search the N.C. 1810 census records of Barclay, and Ledbetter names, and the Mississippi census records of same and might by chance learn more. It was the estate records of Joseph Barclay and Mary Ledbetter that I had wanted, as I was, at that time, confused in the names.

My ancestor was Henry Brazelton Barclay, born June 7 1814. He had a son, James K. P. Barclay, who married Mary Locklin. They had a daughter Alice Barclay, (my mother), who married Tom Barge. So you see Henry B. Barclay, was my great grandfather, son of Joseph and Mary Ledbetter. I will need to get into my charts to send a family chart, and will do so, as soon as I am able. Will also send to you the Ledbetter family records, as obtained from Court records.

Oh yes, one daughter of Joel Ledbetter, married Henry BRAZELTON. It is the closest connection I have of the Brazelton name into the lines. All records, in Texas, show Henry B. Barclay, was named after his mother's maiden name. This cannot be correct per all court records. Henry B. Barclay, possibly named after his UNCLE, by marriage to his mother's sister's husband.***12-----Or perhaps, intermarriage of Ledbetter and Barclay names, in some unknown line.

Any way, I am most grateful to you. Mrs Kennamer, or so I thought, she was Mrs.-----Ethel Kennamer, while in Georgia, sent to me the printed booklet, which I copied, and promptly returned as she

High Jackson Personalities

Editors Note—This is the sixth in a series of articles about well-known residents of Scottsboro and Jackson County.

Grady Thomas, Jackson County Superintendent of Education, was born in Ashland, Ala., county seat of Clay County. His parents were the Rev. and Mrs. William R. Thomas, natives of Clay county. His mother was the former Miss Leola Owens.

Supt. Thomas has two sisters, Mrs. James Durden, of Birmingham, and Mrs. George Lancaster, of Gadsden, and his four brothers are Police Chief Vernon Thomas, of Cullman County; Garrett Thomas of Dutton; and Virgil Thomas, of Texas.

The family moved to Scottsboro when Grady was about 11 years old and his father attended the Baptist Institute which was located at the same site as the present Scottsboro High School. The school was changed to a high school and Grady Thomas attended the first term of the Jackson County High School. Later the family moved to Pisgah and Grady attended school there.

During those early years the Rev. Thomas was pastor of several Baptist churches in the coun-

ty. Some of them were Helton Memorial Church, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Nebo, Hollywood Baptist Church. With the assistance of his family, Rev. Thomas also engaged in farming. His wife died in 1924 and Rev. Thomas died in 1946.

Grady Thomas attended school at Dutton later and took a state examination and taught school for one term on Sand Mountain.

In 1914 Grady Thomas and Miss Luella Haynes, of Section, were married. She is a descendant of the Tigie and Haynes families, both well-known early settlers of Sand Mountain. They have two daughters, Mrs. Leroy Airheart, of Scottsboro; and Mrs. Mack Hooper, of Paducah, Ky.; five sons, Coburn Thomas, of Atlanta; Blaine Thomas, of Hollywood; E. G. Thomas, Jr., of Pell City, Fred and Douglas Thomas, of Scottsboro, and 11 grandchildren.

In the early years of their marriage, Mr. Thomas farmed at Dutton, later moved to Langston and carried the U.S. Mail for two years, then moved back to Dutton. In 1930 Mr. Thomas made the important decision to finish high school and enrolled at Pisgah High School, where he graduated in the spring of 1931 along with his son, Coburn. The next fall

Mr. Thomas moved his family to Florence and he attended Florence State Teachers College for a time. There followed a period in which Mr. Thomas taught school and in the summer months attended Florence College working toward his B.S. degree, which he received in 1946. Kappa Phi Kappa and Kappa Mu Epsilon were his fraternities.

Mr. Thomas taught at Rosalie and later at Dutton, where he was principal for 17 years. Following his successful race, and first venture into politics, he took over his duties as Jackson County Superintendent of Education in 1957, and moved to Scottsboro.

Supt. Thomas has been a member of the Baptist Church since his boyhood, and was active in church work in Section and Dutton. He taught the Men's Sunday School class at Dutton Baptist Church for 25 years. He is a member of the First Baptist Church here.

Supt. Thomas is a Mason and a Shriner and is a charter member of the Rotary Club. He is an ardent sports fan, especially interested in basketball. He played baseball on the Dutton team as a youth and also played with adult teams for several years.
