Sarah St. Clair - - Born March 28 - 1814, in Tennessee
Died June 25 - 1871, (T. S.)

Both are buried in a private cemetery near a Baptist Church on Ryland road
in Madison County, Alabama, above are their tombstone inscriptions.
(Question) - Was Sarah St. Clair a Berry and a daughter of Ephraim Berry?(?)
EPHRAIM BERRY was a Primitive Baptist Preacher.

Primitive Baptist Notes: E. R. Berry in 1859 was a delegate from Providence
church in Maynard's Cove, Jackson county, Alabama, along with Thos. Wilson, (?)
and Jon(?) Potter. (Was this Jonathan Potter who is buried in the Bynum cemetery.)

Stevenson Pioneer Now Lives In Texas

The article below of S. W. Norwood was handed to me by Mayor Jack Rudder, taken from "The Shamrock Texan" a weekly newspaper published in Shamrock, Texas.

Mr. Rudder feels that he is known by many of the elderly citizens of Stevenson community and that they would like to know where he is located since he left Stevenson some fifty-three years ago.

Shamrock, Texas, Aug. 31.—Fifty-three years ago S. M. Norwood first vice president and one of the first directors of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank, came to the Panhandle and filed on land three miles from the town, Shamnorwood which bears his name.

That was in 1897 when Mr. and Mrs. Norwood moved from Stevenson, Alabama, where they had married in 1892. In 1909 when the F. and M. was organized Mr. Norwood was vice president. He served in that capacity and as director until 1917 when he succeeded E. L. Woodley as president. In December, 1921, after four years of presidency Mr. Norwood resigned his position.

Although his health prevents him from visiting with his friends as much as he would like Mr. Norwood is loved by both his new and old acquaintances. He was never a strong man and in 1892 when he married the former Temple Hall, friends said he would not live three years. He was 90 years old last October 2, and although blind for nearly 10 years he takes keen interest in local and national affairs and keeps abreast of the times through his radio and Mrs. Norwood's read of the papers.

"I just laughed him out of dying," declares Mrs. Norwood, who flits around the big farm home doing all the work herself. You can't be around her five minutes before you are laughing with her.

Mr. Norwood sums up his philosophy: "Deal justly with your fellow man, love mercy, and honor God."

INTERESTING LETTER OF CIVIL WAR TIMES

(Printed in Texas Newspaper)

Hugh McKay of the Lonelm community has in his possession a letter received by his mother from her first husband, Rob C. Pierce, who was a soldier in the Confederate army during the War between the States. The original letter has been in Mr. McKay's possession many years and he naturally prizes it very highly. After the writer's death the recipient of the letter was married to J. W. McKay, whose death occurred in 1911. The letter follows:

"To Mrs. Mary Isabel Pierce,
Scottsboro, Ala.
From Winchester, Tenn., Jan 8,
1863.

Dear Isabel:

I will drop you few lines to let you know that I am well at present. I would not write so soon again, but I am aware that you are uneasy as there was a battle going on when I wrote before.

Well, I wrote on Saturday evening and that night at midnight we were ordered in lines. I thought that we would get to try our springs but we were ordered back to Shelleville, which is 25 miles and it is dark and rainy. We marched all night and till 2 o'clock, then encamped for the next night, and from there to Tulohoma, then from there to this place, which is Winchester, a distance of about 60 miles.

I am provost guard here but can't tell how long I will stay. This is an easy place to fill. I am still with the 15th Tennessee Regiment, but as soon as this retreat is over, I will go to the 4th Tennessee or to Smith's Cavalry. I am allowed to take my choice of companys. If I go to Smith's I will come by home to get me a horse. We will fall back to Bridge Port in a few days or give Old Abe's boys a good whipping in a short time.

I wrote to you and sent it by Shelton. I suppose that we are ordered back to Shelleville tomorrow, but I think that if that is so, I won't be able to go for I am worn out from marching here. My opinion is that we will fall back to Chattanooga soon. Our loss at Murfreesboro was heavy—6 or 7 thousand; and the

Yankees' were eight to ten thousand killed or wounded; 6 or 7 thousand prisoners and 34 pieces of artillery. As to beef, mules and wagins. I can's tell anything about that.

I have seen bad luck. Lost both my blankets one night. I bought one for five dollars, as heavy as both of mine. I wish two pairs of my pants were at home for my load is too heavy and I can't sell them here.

You need not write yet for I can't tell you where to write to. I would be glad to see you and be at home, you know, but can't

say when that will be.

Do the best you can and try to be careful as possible. There are better days, not far distant, for the troubled. I could be satisfied if it were not for you. I am anxious to hear from home, and as soon as I can tell you where to write I will do so.

I am granddaughter of Henrietta Brooke, daughter of Richard Brooke and Nancy Watts; granddaughter of Richard Brooke. In the history of King and Queen County, Virginia, we find that Col. George Brooke was born at Mantapike in 1726. He represented King and Queen County in the house of Burgesses up to the Revolution and was a delegate to the constitutional convention from March 20th, 1775 to May 6th, 1776. He was a colonel in the Revolutionary War. A Robert Brooke, knight of the golden horseshoe, was a brother of Humphrey Brooke, who died in 1738. They had a brother William, who had four sons, one being named Richard, I would like the connection between this Richard Brooke and Col. George Brooke.

Answer - If any of our readers have Brooke data that would assist on this we would like to hear from them. Rev. Alfred Bagby's History of King and Queen ~~###~~ County, Virginia, published by the Neale Publishing Co., 1908, gives sketches of "Mantapike" the Brooke family home, for many generations, mentions George Brooke of the army, a son of Humphrey Brooke and nephew of Robert Brooke: records the death of Humphrey Brooke as in 1738, records Col. George Brooke of Mantapike, as born in 1728, died April 1782; gives his activities, and mentions Robert Brooke, knight of the golden horseshoe, brother of Humphrey and William who had four sons, Richard of Mantapike, John, William Jr., and Robert and refers to Gen. George Mercer Brooke a son of Richard, but does not give the full lines.

Dear Mrs. Benson:-

So far I have not been able to trace your husband's Benson family line very far back. I'll tell you what I do know about it.

William Benson, Sr., who was born in Delaware about 1795, married Katherine Shell, who was born in North Carolina about 1798. She was the daughter of John Shell and he was born in North Carolina about 1776. He was still living in 1860 at which time he lived with William Benson, Sr., in Zachary, Marshall County, Alabama. In 1860, John Shell was 84 years of age. He was Dutch.

William Benson, Sr., and Katherine (Shell) Benson, had the following children:

1. Katherine Benson, who married Simeon P. Clack, on April 10th, 1847.
2. Rebecca J. Benson, born in Tennessee about 1819.

In 1860, Isaac Spencer Benson was married to Mary J. - - ? and they had two children: Rebecca J. Benson, age 4 and William S. Benson, aged 3.

At that date Robert Benson was also married to Martha A. Benson, but they had no children and in 1860 Rebecca J. Benson, James F. Benson and Benjamin L. Benson, were still living with their parents.

Also living with William Benson, Sr., and his wife Katherine (Catherine) in 1860 were their grandchildren, William J. Benson, aged 8 years, Isabella Benson, age 6 years and Newton Wesley Benson, age 3 years. The last child, Newton Wesley Benson was born in Texas. Also living with them was John Shell, aged 84 years.

I do not know where Wiley A. Benson, Newton G. Benson, and William Benson, Jr. were in July 1860, but I do know that they were not shown as living in Marshall County at that date. I suspect that one of them was dead and was the father of the grand children living with William Benson, Sr.

In 1850 William Benson, Jr., was living in Marshall County, but I could not find him there in 1860. In 1850, he was married to Jane N. Weldman, and had the following children: Katherine E.; Horace L.; William G.; Sarah A.; Hugh T.; and James H. (That is all I know about him.)

James F. Benson had two sons, Newton Wesley Benson and John Benson, who went to Oklahoma and died there in 1910. (That is all I have been able to learn about James F. Benson and his family).

Now according to the letter I had from your husband in 1951, his great grandfather was married to a Shell, and had seven sons. Therefore I am sure that the great grandfather's name was William Benson, Sr., who came from Delaware, for he had seven sons and one of them was named James Benson. Your husband said that all seven sons went to the Civil War and that only three returned.

Another Benson family was living in Marshall County, Alabama, at the same time that William Benson, Sr., lived there.

This other Benson was James Benson, was also born in Delaware and I suspect that he was an older brother to William Benson, Sr. This James Benson was aged 67 years in 1850, living with ~~#####~~ him were Comfort S. Benson, age 29, a daughter, I think, Jane Benson, age 26; James M. Benson, aged 19 and Solomon Benson, aged 15. James Benson was still living in Marshall County in 1860. At that date Comfort S. Benson, was living with him; but Solomon Benson had married Charlotte - - - - ? and they had two children, James Newton Benson, age 1 year and Martha J. Benson age 5 months. James M. Benson had also married by that date to Sintha J. - - - - ? and their children were Salina L. Benson age 4; Nancy R. Benson, nine months.

This is copied from "History of the Bynum Family", written in 1916 by, J. B. Bynum, Coverts, Alabama.

"ROBERT & HUGH BYNUM" - - Robert Bynum was born in 1800 and died in 1870.(?)

He lived with an uncle, Daniel Bynum in South Carolina. His father died when he was small. He had two sisters, Martha and Sarah, who also lived with their uncle. When he was ten years of age he went with a family to Adair County, West Kentucky. From there he moved to Scottsboro, Ala. He was about 25 years old. He never went to his old home again.

Jasper L. Bynum had one son named Thomas Bynum by his first wife, who went west to Texas and died out there.

Jesse Wilburn Bynum married first to Mrs. Martha Ann (Bellomy) Foster, widow of Lorenza Dow Foster. He married the second time to Betsy Precise. There were no children to either of these marriages.



We clip the following in reference to the matter from the Nashville Union & American:

Gen. Butler and the Swords of Gen. Twiggs.

Gen. Benj. B. Butler has been sued in a New York court by Miss Rowena Florence, of New Orleans, for the value of certain silver plate, and also three jeweled swords, given her by Gen. David Twiggs, which she charges Butler took from her while in command of New Orleans. Butler was arrested and held to bail to answer the charge. The arrest of Butler recalls the following history of the swords: On the 1st of July, 1862, Gen. Butler, in a letter to President Lincoln, accompanying the swords, made the following statement:

"Twiggs left these swords with a young woman on the evening before he fled from New Orleans, and in his flight on the day of the approach of the fleet, he wrote in his carriage, while en-route, this extraordinary paper:

"I leave my swords to Miss Rowena Florence, and box of silver.

D. E. Twiggs.

"NEW ORLEANS, April 25, 1862."

"The paper was claimed as a deed of gift of these very valuable weapons by the young woman named, but as she had neglected to inform her father of this singular donation causa fuge, and as the girl's mother caused them to be given to a negro to be sent back to Gen. Twigg's house, I ventured to interfere with this testamentary disposition."

When Congress assembled, Mr. Lincoln sent the following message to the two Houses:

"Fellow-citizens of the Senate and House of Representatives: I have in my possession three valuable swords, formerly the property of Gen. David E. Twiggs, which I now place at the disposal of Congress. They were forwarded to me from New Orleans by Gen. B. F. Butler. If they or any of them shall be by Congress disposed of, in reward or compliment of military service, I think Gen. Butler is entitled to the first consideration. A copy of the General's letter to me, accompanying the swords, is herewith transmitted.

Editor of the Alabama Herald:

The prospects for fine crops were good until within the last six or eight days. Our crops are now suffering badly for the want of rain. On Larkin's Fork every thing looks well, from Butler's to the head of the Fork, and up Estill's Fork and Hurricane Forks of Paint Rock the crops are looking fine. On the 1st day of August, I started on a trip through Madison county, I went by the way of Maysville, and from the appearance of the crops, they seem to have had plenty of rain. From Maysville to Big Cove is a most beautiful country, and fine land. I spent two days in that neighborhood, and from there to Vienna and Deposit, all the way, I noticed that the crops looked well. I crossed the river at Deposit and went to Warrenton, or near there, the crops were looking very well.

Health here is very good. William Freeman, an old citizen, died last night, of old age, he lived near this place.

A Letter From Florida.

Wauchula, Fla. Dec. 12, 1903.

DEAR CITIZEN:

Please change my paper to Wauchula, Fla., as I will spend the winter here.

Wauchula is on the Southern Division of the old Plant System now the Atlantic Coast Line, running from LaReland to Ft. Myers. It is the only railroad on the west coast, consequently does an immense business during the winter months.

This county, (De Soto) is the leading orange growing section in the state. Wauchula ships more oranges, one town excepted, than any other point in the state. Up to date more than 51,000 boxes have been shipped from here, and still all the packing houses are very busy. One more week and the packing in this section will practically be over. I visited a small pinery four miles from here a few days ago. It was a beautiful sight. The owner one year ago set out 900 pines, 899 lived and each bore a nice fruit. He sold the fruit at 20¢ a piece in the pinery. The plants were set 18 by 2 feet, so you see it took a small plot of ground to grow them. The great expense is the shed under which the pines are grown. This section of the state is growing very rapidly.

I hope to go on a camp hunt to the lakes 30 miles to the interior soon.

I would most respectfully call the attention of all concerned to the 9th. article and 3rd. Section of the School Laws of the State of Alabama. That article and section of the law requires that the county Supt. and school Directors, shall meet at the court house of each county, on the first Monday in January, April, July, and October, of each year***And they shall examine applicants for the position of teacher in the Free Public schools, and give certificates to such applicants**and, no teacher shall teach in the free public schools in any county in this State unless he has obtained such certificate; said county Superintendent and Director shall, at said sessions, also approve contracts made between Township Trustees and Teachers, and no such contract shall be valid until approved. The school Directors of this county will, in compliance with the above law, meet me at Scottsboro on the first Monday in April next, and all persons wishing to teach in public schools, in this county, will also meet myself and the Directors at the same time and place for the purpose of being examined and licensed? and all contracts made between Township Trustees and Teachers, will then be approved by the board of Directors; so Teachers or Trustees will forward all such contracts, which have not been approved, to me at Scottsboro. I would say to the teachers, who taught in public schools in this county in the latter part of last year, wait patiently a little longer, and you shall have your money. I will be at Scottsboro at my office, back room, of Horton's Drug Store, on Wednesday and Thursday of each week until the first Monday in April next.

Dr. J. W. Beeson Dies in Atlanta.

Distinguished Georgian Was Father Of Dwight Beeson Of Huntsville, Alabama.

Dr. John Wesley Beeson, 90, father of Dwight M. Beeson of Huntsville, died this morning in a hospital in Atlanta.

Dr. Beeson was born in North Alabama near Gadsden.

Funeral services will be from St. Paul's Methodist Church in Atlanta at 11 a.m. Saturday.

Dr. Beeson was educated at the University of Alabama, where he received his A.B. degree in 1886, and his M.A. degree in 1888. He was subsequently presented with an honorary LL.D. by the University of Alabama for his distinguished service in the field of education.

Dr. Beeson was the founder and president of Meridian College and Conservatory of Music, located in Meridian, Miss.

Subsequent to selling the college in 1918, he moved to Atlanta, where he entered the life insurance business as Georgia state manager for the Liberty National Life Insurance Co., which position he held until 1943 when he retired.

One of his outstanding achievements was his invention and development of the dry kiln process for preserving the Southern sweet potato for winter consumption, which resulted in popularizing the use of the yellow yam in Northern states. Feeling that this process would benefit the Southern farmer, he refused to patent his idea, which with variations is still the accepted method for preserving sweet potatoes.

Dr. Beeson was an active layman in the Methodist Church most of his life. He is survived by his wife, Nettie Walker Beeson, and three sons, all of previous marriages - Dr. Marvin F. Beeson of San Antonio, Texas, Ralph W. Beeson of Birmingham, Alabama and Dwight M. Beeson of Huntsville, Alabama. Also surviving him is one brother, Dr. M. A. Beeson of Stillwater, Oklahoma; two sisters, Mrs. E. T. Bruce of Bruceville, McLennan County, Texas, and Mrs. John O'Gwyen of Mobile, Alabama, and two grand children and five great grandchildren, all of California.

In Martha Ada Beeson Farmer, God indeed selected a choice vessel, and through the power of the Holy Spirit she became, in the fullest sense of the phrase, "meet for the Master's use."
Edward Beeson and his wife, Rachel Permyngton, came to America from Lancaster, England, with the followers of William Penn. Their ancestors had come from France to Berkeley County, Virginia, then a pioneer settlement of Quakers. They were blessed with four sons, the second Richard, became a Quaker preacher, while the third, Isaac Beeson, moved to North Carolina. It is from this latter branch of the family that Capt. W. B. Beeson, the father of Mrs. Farmer, springs.
The ancestry of the Beeson family was of average ability, intellectually and socially. They were large of stature, strong and robust, and especially noted for their large families. Numbers of them were farmers, mechanics and business and professional men. One or two were members of the State Legislature and also filled State and County offices. One went to Congress, and one was district judge of Alabama.
Alfred Beeson, the grandfather of Mrs. Farmer, was a useful and representative man of his day, when a young man he volunteered for service in the war of 1812, being a participant in many battles of that period, notably that of New Orleans, on the 8th of January, 1815.
After the war, he settled in Alabama where he reared a large family. Besides filling the office of Magistrate he was a leader and teacher in his community. He died in 1842, when W. B. Beeson was about thirteen years of age, and consequently the latter was denied the advantages of a good education.

He lived with two of his uncles until 1849,
when he went to work on another farm
at very low wages, in order to get money
enough to support and educate himself.
Some of the indomitable courage and success
of his life may be traced back to his
youthful days. He was a country species of
a boy, and his father a boy, they that show
the same qualities. He was a member of the
Academy, which he was
in 1847. He was married in
1847 to Miss Mary Sibley, the daughter of
a prominent member, one of the first settlers
of the State. After his marriage he again
engaged in a business of several
years. His entire participation was trans-
ferred to the sea when the Civil War came on.
He volunteered for service, and entered the Confederate
army as a first lieutenant, but was soon promoted
to the rank of major of Company G, of the Forty-ninth
Regiment of Alabama Volunteers. He served from
December, 1861 till the surrender. He fought at
Shiloh, and at Fort Hudson, where he was wounded
in the left arm, captured and sent to Johnson's Island.
After his exchange, he took part in all the
fighting around Atlanta, was at the battles of
Fayette and Bentonville, North Carolina, and
finally surrendered at Greensboro, N.C.
